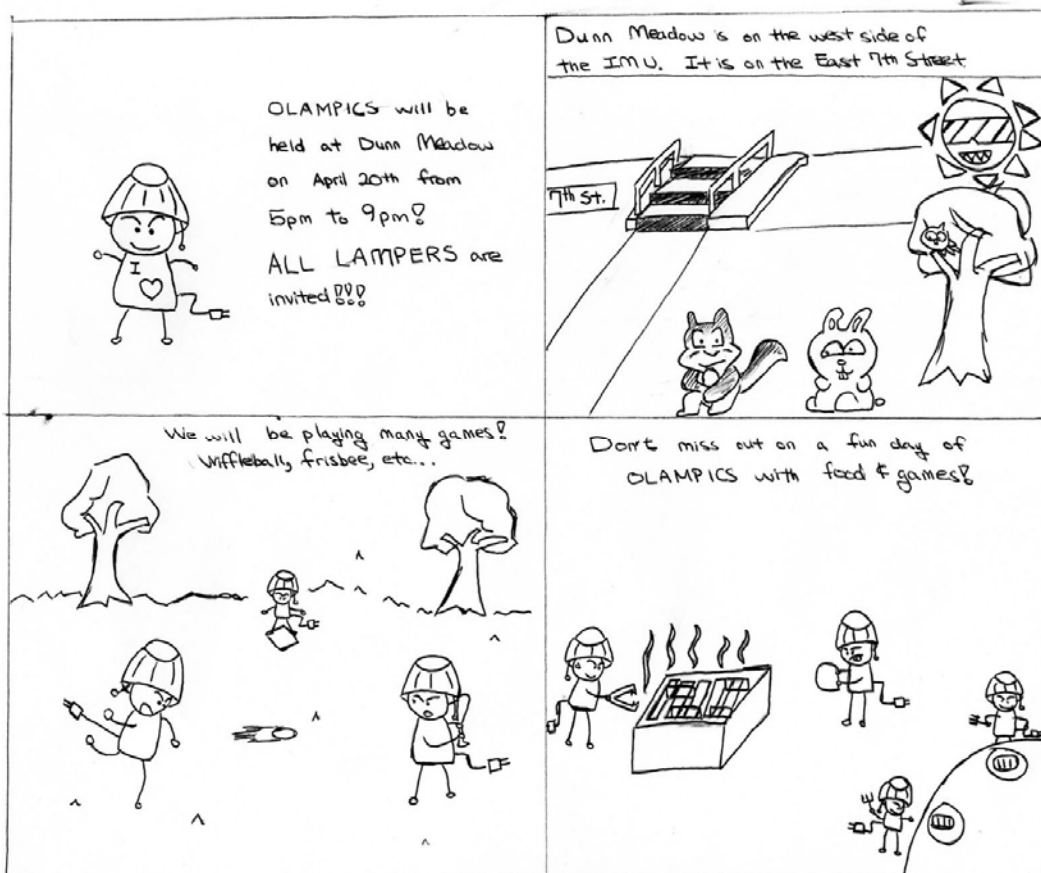

As LAMP students, a wealth of opportunities are available to us; one of which is attending Leadership Luncheons. Keeping with LAMP's credo that "one perspective is never enough," the luncheon guests come from a variety of careers ranging from investment banking to hospital administration. On February 22nd, David and Cheryl Morley, an extraordinarily successful married couple, shared their professional and familial experiences with LAMPers. Raising two children while being employed at prestigious and demanding positions at Monsanto Co., the Morleys have perfected the balancing act of career and family, while also contributing significantly to philanthropic initiatives.

During the luncheon, the conversation flowed from genetically modified foods to education in public school systems. The Morleys also discussed the various scholarships they fund. Recently, they have committed to an annual endowment of \$1,000 for a LAMP student interning for a non-profit organization over the summer. LAMP graduation exemplifies the talents and goals of LAMP individuals. It is an inspiring ceremony that is atypical at a university of 30,000 students. The graduation ceremony is held in the Tudor Room of the Indiana Memorial Union. Graduates and their families along with LAMP faculty and staff will join together to enjoy a meal and celebrate past and anticipated successes. Following dinner, each student is presented with a gift to remember LAMP by as a professor says a few words about the student. LAMP students' individuality, contributions, achievements, and aspirations are the focus of the ceremony, making it a memorable and moving experience.

Each year the LAMP community graduates around 80 students who venture out to different parts of the world to make a difference. This year LAMP has a large number of students going to various companies such as GE, Procter & Gamble, Goldman Sachs, and BP. Several students have been accepted to medical schools and law schools, others will be working in state and national government positions, and some will work with Teach for America and the Peace Corps. This year's ceremony is on Friday, May 2 from 6:30-8:30pm in the Tudor Room of the Indiana Memorial Union. The following testimonies are a sample of the graduating class of 2008.

These words ring true to every student and physician volunteer who recently had the opportunity to participate in the Timmy Foundation medical service trip to the Dominican Republic.

Despite challenging living conditions, the children still had the brightest smiles on their faces. The adults were so grateful to receive a small bag of medication, and others were overjoyed to receive simple hygiene products. The things we take for granted on a daily basis seemed to be a highlight of their life. It is the greatest feeling to know that our efforts, knowledge, and compassion can improve the health and lives of those whose voices are seemingly nonexistent in their impoverished country and therefore normally receive no medical attention.

The people we helped and the lives we touched brought more satisfaction than any other experience of my life, and I know all other 20 students on the trip feel the same.

Thanks to my hands-on experiences in the Dominican Republic, I am confident that medicine is what I want to do with the rest of my life. It was an honor to work with the Timmy Foundation and know that my spring break was spent in an ongoing effort to improve health-care throughout the world.
