1 For PACE SUMMER internships, PLEASE NOTE:

1. You must first have applied to add the PACE certificate. See <http://pace.indiana.edu/program/apply.shtml> .
2. Submit to Joelene a copy of the C410 proposal and the letter of understanding, approved and signed by your site supervisor. You should indicate your plan for the number of hours to be worked weekly, keeping in mind that 3 credits requires 150 hours, including the academic work you complete for C410. 3. You will then receive online authorization to enroll for the C410 credit.

5 Global Leadership Program (Most courses would count as PACE electives. Please let Joelene know if you are applying.)

The Global Leadership Program (GLP) is a 4-week comprehensive academic leadership program that includes: university courses, cultural activities, and community service. The program is open to students from around the world. They offer specially designed courses which focus on issues of global importance. Each course is both interactive and challenging. All courses are taught in English and fully accredited.

Regular admission deadline is January 15 (though for IU students this can be extended) and late admission deadline is February 15.

A new website called DemocracyU has launched to highlight the inspiring work that engaged students are achieving at universities, colleges and communities across the country. The site will include students' personal stories of off-campus activities as well as discussion and debate on the evolving role of university and college students in engaging in public work that benefits society. DemocracyU will officially launch in January at the White House as part of a project called the American Commonwealth Partnership (ACP). The ACP is part of a coordinated effort to begin a year of activity called, "For Democracy's Future – Reclaiming Our Civic Mission." As part of the initiative, the Department of Education is preparing a policy initiative to strengthen civic learning and democratic engagement in higher education and education broadly.

The theme for this year's meeting, **Civic Engagement 2.0: Re-Imagining, Strengthening and Deepening Our Civic Work**, is inspired by web 2.0 applications (e.g., social media, blogs, Wikis) that are not only the next iteration of an existing application, but also facilitate collaboration, information sharing, and user-centered design. The theme poses the following set of questions: *How can we make existing civic education and engagement efforts more student and citizen centered? What can we do to make ADP more interactive, participative and discovery driven? How can we harness new technologies to engage more students and/or to make our teaching and programming more effective?*

Registration is now open. The annual meeting begins on Thursday, June 7 with day-long pre-conference workshops and an opening plenary at 4 P.M. The meeting culminates with a closing speaker followed by a closing reception from 6 P.M. to 8 P.M. on Saturday, June 9.

"While attending IU I found that I really have a passion for doing work that makes a positive social impact, and wanted to apply my business knowledge to a career doing nonprofit work... Currently I work for Feeding America, the largest hunger-relief organization in the United States. I am working at the Second Harvest Food Bank of Greater New Orleans and Acadiana to expand and sustain their child hunger programs. I have only been in this position for a few months, but have found it to be extremely rewarding while also being very challenging. It is very exciting to work for an organization who is dedicated to eliminating the problem of hunger in the United States, and I already feel like I am making a difference.

"I began working at Big Brothers Big Sisters, a national mentoring organization during my third year of college. This job allowed me to start to develop my leadership skills while also getting more first-hand experience in working for a nonprofit community organization. I worked with other college students in event planning, project management, and recruiting, and was really able to see that a nonprofit career was a perfect fit for me...I am not sure where my career will lead following my job at Feeding America, but I will definitely continue to work for organizations that make a positive social impact."
