

Attainment's Explore Your Community



When we think about the word "inclusion," many of us think first about the process of including children with disabilities in schools. Inclusion is not, however, just about schools. It's about being included in everyday life, whether that means school, college, places of worship, or the community itself.

To help include people with disabilities in the community, CeDIR recently purchased a curriculum from Attainment Company called *Explore Your Community*. The curriculum has an instructor's guide with CD, a student book, and a DVD. This curriculum is designed for adolescents and adults with developmental disabilities who read at a second grade level or below. Filled with illustrations to guide the student's understanding of the preferred way to behave in the community, this curriculum is accessible for many people.

Contents in the Student Book include: Getting around your community, At home with friends, Being with other people, and Out shopping. Quizzes, problem solving questions, vocabulary words, tips, and more round out the end of each chapter in the Student Book. The Instructor's Guide includes an overview of each topic, role play suggestions, and assessments. The DVD is a component of the curriculum and consists of 26 video lessons organized into six units. The video lessons reflect the learning that happens in the Student Book.
