### Free Webinars on the ADA

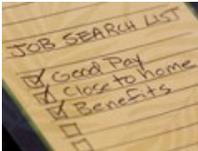
The [Great Lakes ADA Center](#) and the [ADA National Network](#) are sponsoring two free webinars this week. On Wednesday, May 18, from 2:00-3:30 p.m., higher education and the ADA will be the discussion topic.

Colleges, universities and community colleges are covered by either Titles II or III of the ADA. Questions frequently arise about the types of reasonable accommodations and modifications required under the ADA, including accessible educational materials, as well as the rights of students who are dismissed from school because of their disability. This webinar will review the relevant federal regulations and case law in this quickly developing arena.

On Thursday, May 19, 2016, the importance of accessibility in disability employment will be addressed. This webinar will be held from 2:00 - 3:30 p.m. with [registration required](#).

This session will discuss ongoing research around job seeker challenges and frustrations when applying for positions on non-accessible websites. 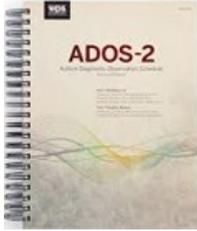
## Customized Employment Training

Last month, the Institute's [Center on Community Living and Careers](#) kicked off a new advanced employment specialist training for Indiana employment professionals. The 2016 *Job Development Series* goes beyond the basics to help staff of community employment providers as they structure individualized employment supports for their job seekers.

*Customized Employment*, the second training in the series, takes place June 9, 2016 at Easter Seals Crossroads in Indianapolis and will feature senior consultant Russ Sickles of Griffin Hammis Associates. This one-day, face-to-face training will be followed up with a *Check & Connect* webinar on July 14, 2016 from 2:00-3:00 p.m., exclusively for training participants.

The registration fee for each training and its accompanying webinar is \$75.00 The next training in the series is *Building Business Relationships* and is planned for August 17, 2016 with a follow-up webinar on September 15, 2016.

## Autism Diagnostic Observation Schedule 2nd Edition (ADOS-2) Workshop

The [Indiana Resource Center for Autism](#) will host a two-day workshop that will provide a unique opportunity for attendees to learn directly from a co-author of the *Autism Diagnostic Observation Schedule*. The administration of the five modules of the ADOS-2 will be outlined along with video demonstrations of some of the modules in order to analyze and discuss scoring criteria in detail.

Goals and objectives of the workshop are:

- To develop familiarity with the ADOS-2 as a diagnostic tool.
- To learn about the semi-standardized administration of the ADOS-2.
- To practice scoring the ADOS-2 based on video demonstration.
- To learn about the interpretation and reporting of ADOS-2 results.

Registration fee is \$380.00 which includes all required materials for the workshop (such as scoring protocols). Registrants will also receive a DVD during the workshop that has two administrations of the *ADOS-2* to view afterward. Participants may find it useful to bring an *ADOS-2* manual to the training as a reference. All registrations are processed online by Indiana University (IU) Conferences. [In this issue](#), mid-year results from the second year of the Early Education Matching Grant (EEMG) evaluations are featured. The EEMG is Indiana's initial public Pre-K effort and the grant provides high quality (Paths to Quality levels 3 and 4) preschool

programming to 4-year old children from low income families. Articles in this issue will review demographic data of current EEMG children and programs, the initial assessment data indicating the skills children had prior to their EEMG enrollment, and classroom quality data from EEMG classroom observations.
