1. Thanks from United Way: IUSB faculty and staff members contributed \$6,300 to the 1974 United Way of St. Joseph County campaign.

Campaign chairman Thomas A. DeCoster expressed thanks to all givers on behalf of the 30 social service agencies which will benefit from the campaign.

2. Race-Relations Lecture: Dr. George M. Fredrickson, Professor of History at Northwestern University, will discuss "Race Relations in South Africa and the United States: Some Historical Parallels and Differences" at 8:15 p.m. Thursday in N158. The lecture is sponsored by the IUSB Department of History.

Dr. Fredrickson is the author of a widely-discussed paper entitled "A Man But Not a Brother: Abraham Lincoln and Racial Equality" and of several books, including "Black Image in the White Mind" and "The Inner Civil War: Northern Intellectuals and the Crisis of the War."

3. Where is 'The Philosopher'? -- Otis S. Romine, Business Manager and Associate Lecturer in Business Administration, would like to borrow the reproduction of Rembrandt's painting "The Philosopher" from whoever now has it. He needs it for about 48 hours for use in connection with a class. The reproduction once hung in the upper-level corridor of Northside Hall, near the east door to the auditorium balcony. 4. Fort Wayne Governance: The trustees of Indiana and Purdue Universities last week approved unification of their separate administrative staffs on the jointly-occupied Fort Wayne campus with a single chancellor, effective July 1, 1974.

To be appointed upon recommendation of Purdue's President Arthur G. Hansen and Indiana's President John W. Ryan, the new chancellor will report to both presidents. Purdue will serve as the fiscal agent for all appropriations, fees, and earnings. The separate academic mission of the two universities, which became effective in the fall of 1967, will remain unchanged for the present.

A search and screening committee to make recommendations of candidates for the new post will be named shortly by the two presidents. It will include members of each of the faculties at Fort Wayne, members of each of the Fort Wayne student bodies, representatives of the Fort Wayne community, and representatives of the central administrations of the universities.

Details of the fiscal and management operation will be worked out by the two universities' financial vice presidents and their staffs, with the assistance of university counsels, for approval of the presidents and boards of trustees. If legislation is required in the process, it will be presented to the 1974 General Assembly.
