GENERAL INFORMATION

OFFICE HOURS: Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. COUNSELING HOURS: The Counseling Office is open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 to 8 p.m. It is generally desirable to make an appointment.

LIBRARY HOURS: Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 10 p.m., Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

ACADEMIC COUNSELING: A program of counseling, coordinated with the program on the Bloomington Campus, is available at the South Bend Campus through the Academic Counselor. All new students and others having questions concerning their programs should meet, before they register, with the Academic Counselor. Students who will continue at Indiana University the study of a foreign language begun elsewhere are required to take the Foreign Language Placement Test. For date of this test, consult the Calendar.

REGISTRATION: See Calendar for days and hours of registration. Full-time students carry from twelve to seventeen hours per semester. Five or six hours only per semester are recommended for students who are employed full time. Deviation from recommended loads must be approved by the Academic Counselor. Complete information on degree programs, course descriptions, academic policy, and general policies of the Campus may be found in the BULLETIN OF THE REGIONAL CAMPUSES.

FEE PAYMENT POLICY: Fees are due in full at the time of registration. They may be deferred by the Director in unusual cases only. Application for such deferral must be addressed in letter form to the Director prior to September 4, 1964.

STUDENT ACTIVITY FEE: A student activity fee for the support of cultural, recreational, and social programs at the South Bend Campus must be paid by all students enrolled for credit. The amount will be based on the number of credit hours for which the student is enrolled, as follows:

- 12 hours or more \$3
8-11 hours inclusive \$2
7 hours or less \$1

This fee is to be paid at the time of registration.

REFUNDS: Limited refunds may be approved under special circumstances and in accordance with the schedule listed in the general Bulletin of the Regional Campuses and posted on "Official Notice" Bulletin Boards at the South Bend Campus. Refunds are based on the date of the written application for withdrawal. No refunds will be issued if application for withdrawal is made after the end of the fourth week of classes. No refunds will be made of laboratory fees.

VETERANS: Veterans who believe they are entitled to benefits should see the Veteran Records Clerk in the General Office prior to or at the time of registration.

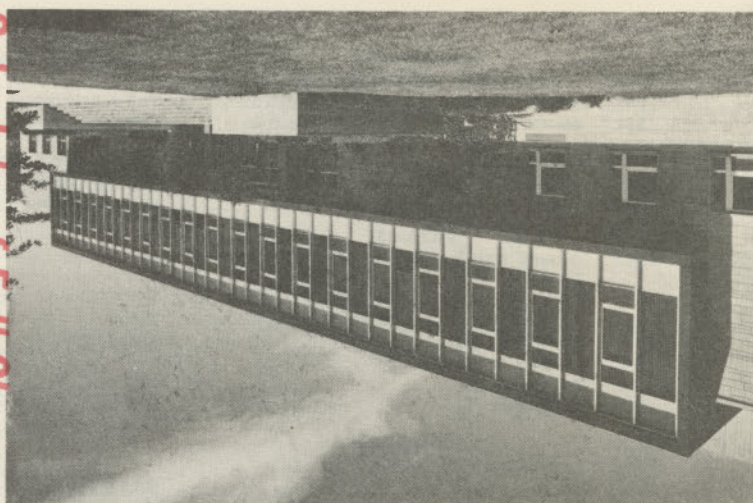

The theatre program at the South Bend Campus, under the direction of Joseph G. Green, invites the participation of all students — credit and non-credit — in its third season. The program is devoted to the presentation of works representative of all major areas of dramatic literature. Plays in our first two seasons have ranged from a Moliere comedy, *The Doctor in Spite of Himself*, to a bill of one act plays from the Theatre of the Absurd. A contemporary interpretation of the classical Antigone legend and Tennessee Williams' modern tragedy, *The Glass Menagerie* completed our repertoire.

This season will see the first South Bend Campus Theatre production of a musical-comedy, a distinctly American dramatic form. For this enterprise, we welcome the cooperation and support of all interested students. The musical, to be presented in mid-November, will be the popular Broadway hit, *Guys and Dolls*, and musicians, singers, and dancers as well as actors are encouraged to come to auditions.

The second major production of the 1964-65 season will be selected from the classical repertoire. Being carefully considered are Euripedes' *Medea* and Racine's *Phaedra*.

In addition to our local productions, we will present two shows from the Bloomington campus. For these traveling plays, we invite the participation of South Bend Campus people interested in technical theatre and promotion.

Finally, a play for children will make an appearance in our Auditorium. It will be either locally produced or come from the Bloomington campus. In either event, it should prove to be an exciting experience.
