1. Summer Calendar: The prospect of a financial loss in fiscal 1974 if the second 1974 summer-session registration is held in July has necessitated a change in the IUSB summer calendar. The following calendar for this summer replaces all earlier published dates for summer sessions.

2. Mileage Up: The 1974 State Legislature authorized increasing the mileage reimbursement allowance from 10 cents to 12 cents per mile, effective April 1.

The I. U. Administrative Committee has approved the increase and the effective date. At the same time, it warned, there will be no increase in travel budgets; thus, the net effect will be fewer miles which can be driven.

3. Dr. Kinsey: Marjorie S. Kinsey, Fine Arts, has completed all requirements for the Ph. D. degree in art history from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. Her dissertation was entitled "The Artistic Sensibility of Charles Baudelaire."
4. Phone Books: New Indiana Bell telephone books have been delivered to faculty secretaries. Any faculty member who hasn't received a new book should check with the appropriate faculty secretary or with Richard Feingold, ext. 320.

Persons interested in recycling old phone books may give them to any faculty secretary or to Mary Sieradzki in the Physical Plant office next to the Northside loading dock.

5. Book Gifts: Two gifts of books to the IUSB Library have been received in recent weeks.

The Kopernik Association of St. Joseph County has donated 20 books in commemoration of the 500th anniversary of the birth of Copernicus. The volumes deal with the Polish astronomer, with Polish literature, and with Polish history in the Old and New Worlds.

The National Bank and Trust Co. of South Bend has donated a 10-volume set of books entitled "Hospitality Industry: Hotel-Motel Management."

6. Staff Meeting: An informal luncheon meeting for all staff employees will be held at noon today in the lounge in NSW 324-326 to discuss proposed by-laws for an IUSB Staff Council. Coffee will be available. Also on the agenda is a discussion of what other staff councils in the I. U. system have accomplished. Administrators and faculty members will be welcome at the meeting.
7. Good Friday: April 12, Good Friday, is a scheduled holiday for staff employees of Indiana University. Because classes will be in session, the buildings will be kept open and some staff members will be required to work. Those who must work will be notified at least 48 hours ahead of time and will receive equal time off later.
8. Urban Walls: "People, Policy, and Urban Walls," a day-long conference dealing with the urban aesthetic environment, will be held Thursday in the Notre Dame Center for Continuing Education. The conference is co-sponsored by IUSB, Notre Dame, the city of South Bend, and the Visual Improvement Program of the South Bend Art Center, with support from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities in cooperation with the National Endowment for the Humanities. Deloris J. Davisson, Fine Arts, and Thomas S. Fern, Notre Dame art chairman, are conference chairpersons.

Major speakers will be Carl W. Condit, professor at Northwestern University's Center for Urban Affairs and a leading historian of the Chicago School of Architecture; David B. Little, director of the Essex Institute, Salem, Mass., and Dennis Weidenaar, a Purdue economist. IUSB will be represented on panels by Ms. Davisson; Wayne F. Echelberger Jr., Public and Environmental Affairs; Chancellor Wolfson, and Harold Zisla, Fine Arts.

The conference is open to anyone interested in the theme. There

will be no registration fee. Luncheon and dinner fees total \$7.50; to register, call 233-8201.

9. Orchestra Concert: The IUSB Orchestra will perform at 8:15 p.m. Friday in the Northside auditorium under the baton of Michael J. Esselstrom. The program includes Symphony No. 5 by Shostakovitch; the Prelude to Humperdinck's "Hansel and Gretel"; Concerto in F minor for Bass Tuba by Handel, and "Un bel di vedremo" from "Madama Butterfly" by Puccini. Soloists are Dolores Wilson, viola; Jerry Lackey, tuba, and Christine Walkowiak, voice.

10. Preview Day: IUSB's preview day and open house will be held Sunday from 4 to 8:30 p.m. in the Northside West corridor off the courtyard. Prospective students, in high school and out, have been invited to tour the campus and talk to faculty members and representatives of the Admissions and Financial Aid offices.

A short formal program is scheduled for 7 p.m. in the auditorium.

11. International Coffee Hour: Foreign students in the South Bend community and area students or faculty members who have studied abroad are invited to a coffee hour for international students at 4:30 p.m. Sunday in the Northside faculty lounge. James A. Yutzy, Education, is coordinator for the event.

12. Choraliers Concert: The Associates Choraliers, a 45-person singing group made up of employees of Associates Corp. of North America, will present "A Family Concert in Spring" at 3 p.m. Sunday in the Northside auditorium. Arthur C. Berg will be soloist and Luke Lovell, an IUSB music major, will be accompanist for the group. There is no admission charge.

13. Presidency Lecture: The second lecture on the Presidency in the spring faculty lecture series will be delivered at 8:15 p.m. Tuesday in N152 by Charles J. Tull, History. He will discuss "The Growth of Presidential Power in the 20th Century." The series is sponsored by the Office of Continuing Education.

14. Physical Plant Committee: The IUSB Physical Plant Committee will meet at 10 a.m. next Wednesday, March 27, in N055. The agenda: Formulation of Guidelines for the Naming of Buildings.

15. Duchamp Exhibition: A bus trip to the Art Institute of Chicago will leave from in front of Northside Hall at 8 a.m. next Wednesday, March 27. The Fine Arts Department-sponsored tour will include a visit to the special exhibition of Marcel Duchamp's

works, circle, and influence on recent decades. There will also be an opportunity to visit Artemisia, the new woman's co-op gallery, and other commercial galleries on Ontario St., as well as the museum of Contemporary Art. The bus will leave from the Art Institute for the return trip at 4 p.m.

16. Lib Cinema: "Three Lives," a film produced and directed by Kate Millet and the Women's Liberation Cinema Co., will be shown at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 27, in NSW 152, and again at 2:30 p.m. Thursday, March 28, in N005. There will be no admission charge.

The film attempts to present the complex truth of modern womanhood. It was produced by an all-female crew and is presented by the Office of Continuing Education.

17. 18th Century Arts: J. H. Plumb, author and editor of the "History of Human Society" series, will discuss "Public Literature and the Arts in the 18th Century" in a lecture at 8:15 p.m. Thursday, March 28, in N104.

Dr. Plumb holds the Ph. D. degree from Cambridge, served in the Foreign Office in World War II, and returned to Cambridge after the war. A frequent visitor to the United States, his books include biographies of Sir Robert Walpole and the First Four Georges. Analytical works include The Growth of Political Stability in England and Churchill Revised.

The lecture is co-sponsored by the IUSB History Department and Student Government.

19. Faculty Activities: Melvin S. Baird, Career Opportunities Program, participated in the C.O.P. National Conference in Dallas March 3-6. He was accompanied to the conference by Edward A. Myers, director of the South Bend C.O.P.

of "The Description of French Varieties in a Continuum Relation" on March 29 at a symposium on "Identite Culturelle et Francophonie dans les Ameriques" at I. U./ Bloomington.

Alfred Fromm, Dental Auxiliary Education, has been appointed dental consultant for the Council for the Retarded of St. Joseph County.

Thomas Joseph, Biology, has been named IUSB representative to the Indiana University Science Advisory Committee for 1974-1977.

Eugene E. Love, University Division, has been elected chairman of the United Negro College Fund campaign for 1974 in St. Joseph and Elkhart Counties.

Barton K. McLean, Music, has been elected to the National Executive Committee of the American Society of University Composers. His composition "Metamorphosis for Orchestra," dedicated to Robert W. Demaree, Jr., will be performed by the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra during the week of April 21-25. During the same week, Dr. McLean will be in Terre Haute, giving seminars; he was chosen, with six others, from more than 200 applicants. He recently spent two days in residence at Ball State University, where his composition "Genesis," for four-channel tape, was played. Another McLean composition, "Dimensions I" for violin and tape, will be played this month at UCLA and on April 9 at Saint Mary's College, Notre Dame, with Madeline Schatz as soloist. The same work will be played by David Mallory, former concertmaster of the San Francisco Symphony, on tour throughout California next fall. Dr. McLean has been invited to be in residence at the University of Ohio in the fall; he will give a concert and conduct seminars.

V. Thomas Mawhinney, Psychology, has passed the requisite oral examination and will receive basic certification as a psychologist by the Indiana State Board of Examiners in Psychology. A research project which he directs at the Northern Indiana State Hospital and Developmental Disabilities Center has received a state grant of \$10,600 for research designed to discover new methods for teaching retarded children to walk.

Manohar D. Nasta and Loren E. Waltz, Business Administration, and Kristin A. Froehlke, Computing Services, have had a paper, "The Design of a University Information Systems Study," accepted for presentation at the Southwest Division convention of the American Institute of Decision Sciences in Dallas March 28. Dr. Waltz will make the presentation, and the paper will be published in the conference Proceedings.
