In preparation for the opening of the Indiana University Libraries' [Scholars' Commons](#), staff from across the libraries including, Collection Development & Scholarly Communication, Library Technologies, Reference Services, and Arts & Humanities, will engage in an extended, hands-on learning project known as Research Now: Cross Training for Digital Scholarship. Our project team will develop a digital archive tentatively called *The History of the Indiana University Libraries*, which is conceived as a comprehensive, multimedia, and perpetual digital archive documenting the earliest days of the Indiana University (IU) Libraries through present times. The archive will serve as an engaged learning opportunity for first-year, front line Scholars' Commons staff as we retool our skills and knowledge in preparation for the opening of the Scholars' Commons.

1. consolidate two parallel web sites that cover the history of the IU Libraries by migrating the existing content into services such as [Archives Online](#), [Image Collections Online](#), and other services for long-term digital preservation and access
2. digitize and describe existing content (35 mm slides, photographs, manuscripts, newspaper clippings and other ephemeral materials and objects) held by Lou Malcomb, Head of Social Sciences, Gov Docs and GeoSciences
3. cross-reference existing digital content about the libraries' history from related resources and repositories
4. identify, digitize, and describe additional materials in existing repositories across campus
5. create and compile original primary and secondary source contextual information by way of oral histories, essays, timelines and chronologies, biographical sketches, bibliographies, and other related information

Above all, this is a learning project for frontline Scholars' Commons staff with three broad goals:

1. to understand the multi-faceted dimensions, iterations and phases involved in designing and developing a curated digital archive
2. to contribute to this project as researchers
3. to cultivate ad-hoc learning strategies

Cross-training began in mid-November 2013, and we would like to take this opportunity to provide you with an overview of our praxis-based cross-training initiative, and an update several months into our program. Colloquium seeks engaging, innovative, and energizing proposals related to the conference theme: Metaliteracy: Seeking Connections and Challenging Traditions.

We seek thought-provoking proposals that examine metaliteracy, which is emerging as a relevant and interesting paradigm that is reshaping the way we think of information literacy and library instruction. As defined by [Mackey and Jacobson \(2011\)](#),

"Metaliteracy promotes critical thinking and collaboration in a digital age, providing a comprehensive framework to effectively participate in social media and online communities. It is a unified construct that supports the acquisition, production, and sharing of knowledge in collaborative online communities. Metaliteracy challenges traditional skills-based approaches to information literacy by recognizing related literacy types and incorporating emerging technologies. Standard definitions of information literacy are insufficient for the revolutionary social technologies currently prevalent online" (p. 62).

Moreover, the current ongoing revision of the ACRL standards includes metaliteracy as an "important anchoring element" in the new [Framework for Information Literacy for Higher Education](#).

This year's Colloquium invites you to investigate the implications metaliteracy has for library instruction theory and practice. Questions to consider include, but are not limited to: What do instruction librarians need to know about metaliteracy? What does metaliteracy look like, and what does it entail? How does it influence what we do in the library instruction classroom? How does this shape our learning outcomes and pedagogy? How do we assess metaliteracy? Clearly, metaliteracy is a stimulating and exciting concept that has much to offer library instruction and we hope that the Colloquium will contribute significant advances to the current conversations on this topic.

Proposal guidelines:

Proposals for 45-minute presentations or 45-minute roundtable discussions should be no more than 250 words in length and should contain at least two learning outcomes. Proposals should be submitted via the online conference proposal [form](#).

All proposals should clearly relate to the conference theme and offer innovative and interesting insights that will enhance the learning of the Colloquium community.

Proposal deadline:

Friday, May 16. Proposal notifications will occur by Friday, May 30.
