1. Site Expansion. On November 20 various officials met in South Bend to hear Johnson, Johnson, and Roy of Ann Arbor present their preliminary thoughts concerning physical site expansion for our Campus. Alternate plans for expanding with primary thrusts to the North, East, South, and West were presented. At a mid-December meeting with President Stahr some of us will be discussing further certain considerations and refinements that bear on this question. We are hoping to have a next large meeting in February with a final recommendation to be made in July. Warren Pepperdine represents our faculty in sitting in on all local deliberations.
 2. Parking Lot. Contracts have been awarded for the expansion of the parking lot to approximately twice its present size. I hope we will be able to announce working and completion dates in the next issue of this newsletter.
 3. Dr. Harvin. As many of you know, Dr. Virginia Harvin, Education, has been confined for some weeks in Memorial Hospital in South Bend. Cards or letters can be sent to her there.
 4. Publications. I am pleased to announce that Dr. Gordon J. DiRenzo, Sociology, has just had his latest book, Personality, Power, and Politics published by the University of Notre Dame press. I would appreciate your letting me know by the 15th of each month what publications, exhibits, performances, etc., you have accomplished in the month preceding--all this so that this aspect of your professional activity may be brought to the attention of your colleagues.
 5. Staffing and Enrollment. There are currently 407 full-time faculty and administrators in the six regional campuses. One hundred and forty-nine of these were added this year and 81.6% (332) have been at the Campuses for three years or less. Although our growth in numbers will be quite modest next year, there will undoubtedly be a vast upsurge again in 1969-70. Another item of possible interest is the enrollment chart for the University for the past 14 years, attached.
 6. Play. Edward Albee's A Delicate Balance will be showing this weekend and next. I hope that it gets the support the developing artistic reputation of our local Campus Theatre deserves.
 7. Research Funds and Summer Fellowships. Full-time faculty with the rank of Instructor or higher have access to summer fellowships and grants-in-aid. Stipends for the summer fellowships range from \$1,000 to \$1,600 according to rank. In order to meet the deadline of December 11 I should have your requests no later than December 4. Grants-in-aid can be applied for at any time. Forms can be obtained from Ruth Meuninck.
