IU Information Literacy Colloquium: Call for Proposals

EVENT: Third Annual Indiana University Libraries Information Literacy Colloquium

DATE: Friday, August 1

PLACE: IU South Bend in South Bend, IN

The Third Annual Indiana University Libraries Information Literacy Colloquium seeks engaging, innovative, and energizing proposals related to the conference theme: Metaliteracy: Seeking Connections and Challenging Traditions.

We seek thought-provoking proposals that examine metaliteracy, which is emerging as a relevant and interesting paradigm that is reshaping the way we think of information literacy and library instruction. As defined by [Mackey and Jacobson \(2011\)](#),

"Metaliteracy promotes critical thinking and collaboration in a digital age, providing a comprehensive framework to effectively participate in social media and online communities. It is a unified construct that supports the acquisition, production, and sharing of knowledge in collaborative online communities. Metaliteracy challenges traditional skills-based approaches to information literacy by recognizing related literacy types and incorporating emerging technologies. Standard definitions of information literacy are insufficient for the revolutionary social technologies currently prevalent online" (p. 62).

Moreover, the current ongoing revision of the ACRL standards includes metaliteracy as an "important anchoring element" in the new [Framework for Information Literacy for Higher Education](#).

This year's Colloquium invites you to investigate the implications metaliteracy has for library instruction theory and practice. Questions to consider include, but are not limited to: What do instruction librarians need to know about metaliteracy? What does metaliteracy look like, and what does it entail? How does it influence what we do in the library instruction classroom? How does this shape our learning outcomes and pedagogy? How do we assess metaliteracy? Clearly, metaliteracy is a stimulating and exciting concept that has much to offer library instruction and we hope that the Colloquium will contribute significant advances to the current conversations on this topic.

EVENT: Indianapolis Indians vs. Durham Bulls

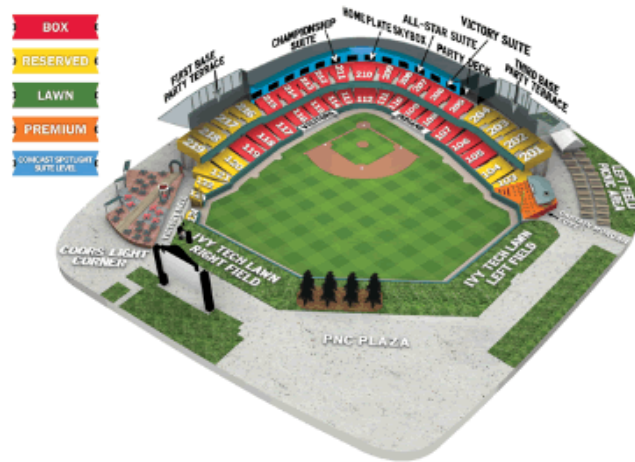
DATE: Friday, June 13

Roger Beckman Retires

Roger Beckman retired from the Libraries on March 31. Roger earned a BA in Anthropology, a Master of Library Sciences (MLS), and a MS in Biology at Indiana University during his 30+ years at Indiana University. One of his post MLS, pre-tenure track roles was as a staff cataloger of Latin American materials for the Lilly Library for two and a half years where he rubbed shoulders with scholars like Charles Boxer, and developed a love of the Lilly where he has volunteered as treasurer of the Friends of the Lilly Library Board for the last several years. After his time as a Lilly Library staff he joined his future wife, Andrea Singer, on a tour of South America for eight and a half months. He was recruited back to Bloomington after this tour and was able to share a joint appointment in Government Publications with his wife so they could both care for their infant son.

Roger considers himself lucky to have worked in so many different units of the IU Library system, e.g., Reference Department, the former Government Publications, Indiana Newspaper Project cataloger [sited at the Indiana State Library] and University Library at IUPUI. At the time of his retirement, Roger was the head of the Indiana University Life Sciences Library and the Chemistry library. During his tenure, he has also served as head of the Optometry Library and acting head of the Swain Hall Library. In addition to his immediate duties as head of two libraries, he held collection development responsibility in the areas of monographs and serials for biology, chemistry, nursing, medical sciences and optometry. Roger has also taught courses in IU's Department of Chemistry and in the School of Library and Information Science.

Roger's service to the profession is also apparent in the leadership positions he has held in professional associations such as the Special Libraries Association, Indiana Online Users' Group, and Indiana University Librarians Association. He has also served as moderator at association conferences and has helped to organize individual sessions for the Special Libraries Association annual conference, such as the Sci-Tech Division Contributed Paper session. Because of his outstanding achievement in service and work with students, Roger received the 2011 Williams Evan Jenkins Librarian Award, named after the first Indiana University librarian and the highest honor his library colleagues can bestow upon a fellow librarian.

After a long and fulfilling career, Roger will no doubt enjoy many of his hobbies during his retirement including woodworking, bricklaying, and bird watching.
