Several other appointments are expected in the next few weeks.

3. Sesquicentennial/Groundbreaking: All are cordially invited to attend the groundbreaking ceremonies for our major, new building at 2 p.m. Wednesday, May 6, behind the West Wing of Northside Hall.

Contracts for the building were approved last Saturday by the I.U. Board of Trustees, in a meeting in Jeffersonville. James S. Jackson Co., Inc., of Bluffton, was awarded the general contract on a bid of \$3,638,248.88.

The mechanical contract went to Dye Plumbing and Heating Co., LaPorte, on a bid of \$1,036,350. Morse Electric Co., Inc., of South Bend, won the electrical contract on a bid of \$382,450. The three contracts total \$5,057,048.88.

The groundbreaking ceremony will include a talk by Fred M. Hechinger, education editor of the New York Times. Mayors Lloyd M. Allen of South Bend and Margaret Prickett of Mishawaka have been invited to join Chancellor Wolfson in turning the first spadeful of dirt for the structure.

Actual construction is expected to begin some time in May; the starting date is not certain. The general contractor has a 600-day completion clause in the contract.

4. Sesqui Week: The groundbreaking will be the focal point of IUSB's share of Indiana University's Sesquicentennial Celebration.

Student activities scheduled for the week will start Saturday, at 9 p.m. in the Hotel LaSalle. The dance, "Serenade in Blue," will feature music by Russ Carlyle and his Orchestra. Tickets are available in the Student Government office.

Channel Paddle Day will be held Monday afternoon on the banks of the St. Joseph River opposite Northside. A lunch and folk concert are scheduled for 11:30 a.m. Afternoon events include a tug-of-war and rowboat races.

A softball game is scheduled in Memorial Park at 2 p.m. on Saturday, and a basketball game is planned in Newman Center at 7 p.m. on Tuesday.

A three-day open house of the university campus will be held Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. Conducted tours will be available to the public, along with invitations to sit in on a number of classes during those three days.

An exhibition of student art will be shown in Northside Hall.

5. Music Open House: The Division of Music of Indiana University at South Bend will hold an Open House from 2 to 5 p.m. Saturday for area high school students interested in pursuing music education at this campus.
6. Last 'Preface': The final issue of The Preface for the 1969/70 year will appear May 14, as listed in the publication schedule carried in the masthead on the editorial page. Deadline for that edition is May 7.

7. Papers: Three IUSB faculty members are authors of papers:

Dr. Gordon J. DiRenzo (Sociology) has been invited to present a paper on "Student Politics and Student Movements" at the meetings of the International Political Science Assn. in Munich, West Germany, from Sept. 1 to Sept. 5. He will report on research conducted on Italian student movements during the 1968/69 academic year while he was serving as Senior Fulbright Professor of Sociology at the University of Rome. He also will fulfill a previous invitation to serve as a discussant of papers for the section on "Psychology and Politics" at the Munich meetings.

Dr. Eldon E. Ruff (Education) and Gerald Dudley, associate faculty member in Education, are co-authors of an article entitled "School Counselor Certification: A Study of Current Requirements" in the March issue of The School Counselor, the official journal of the American School Counselor Assn. The article deals with an analysis of counselor certification requirements in each of the 50 states.
