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1. Teaching Award: Dr. John E. Peck, Economics, was awarded a Standard Oil of Indiana Foundation Award for teaching excellence at today's I.U. Founders Day ceremonies in Bloomington.

The award was one of five presented to full-time I.U. faculty members at today's program. Recipients of the other five awards teach on the Bloomington campus.

It is the second year in which an all-university teaching award has gone to an IUSB faculty member. Last year, H. Prentice Baptiste received a Standard Oil award.

2. Student Speaker: An IUSB senior, Max H. Pope, spoke for the state-wide student body of Indiana University at today's Founders Day program in Bloomington. It was the first time that a student from a regional campus gave the student address at Founders Day.

A May graduate in business, with a finance concentration, Max Pope is the president of the Graduating Class Council of the IUSB Class of 1973.

3. 'Twelfth Night' Symposium: Four faculty members will present a symposium on Shakespeare's Twelfth Night at 7 p.m. today in N013. Participating in the hour-long presentation will be Dr. Gloria Kaufman, English; Ms. Laura Noell, English associate faculty; Dr. Warren H. Pepperdine and Dr. John W. Toth, Communication Arts.

Looking forward to the April 26 opening of the play by Theatre I.U., the four will discuss the magic circle of the play, the history of its production, the acting, and the author's comic vision.

4. Thoughts on Ellsberg: Dr. Peter Fuss, associate professor of philosophy at the University of Missouri at St. Louis, will deliver the second spring lecture dealing with contemporary issues in philosophy at 8 p.m. today in the faculty lounge. His talk, "The Problem-Solvers and the Public: Some Thoughts on Ellsberg, the Pentagon Papers, and the Degeneration of the American Polity," will focus on ethical and social issues raised by the publication of the Pentagon Papers.

Prof. Fuss holds the Ph. D. degree from Harvard University and has taught at the University of Michigan and the University of California at Riverside. He is the author of a book on "Royce's Ethics" and co-author of "Five Philosophers" and "Nietzsche: A Self-Portrait."

5. Secret Agent: Rudolph Kaarlo Tuomi, a former Soviet secret service agent and U.S. counterspy, will deliver a "Diary of a Secret Agent of the Two World Superpowers" in a Student Government-sponsored lecture at 8:15 p.m. Thursday in N152.

6. Trio Concert: Robert D. Hamilton, piano, and Madeline F. Schatz, violin, will be joined by Herbert Butler, cellist and a teacher at Western Michigan University, in a trio concert at 8:15 p.m. Saturday in the Northside West recital hall. Butler was a guest conductor last fall with the South Bend Symphony.

The trio will perform Copland's "Vitebsk"; Beethoven's Trio in D Major (Ghost), and Brahms' Trio in B Major.

7. 'Jefferson and Music': Dr. Helen Cripe, an expert on the third President's abilities as a musician, will discuss "Jefferson and Music" in the final offering of the spring History Lecture Series at 8 p.m. next Wednesday, April 25, in N152.

Dr. Cripe is field director for several cooperative editorial projects headquartered at the James Madison Papers Project of the Alderman Library, University of Virginia. She has published an article on Jefferson's musical program at Monticello in 1972, and is the author of a book, Jefferson and Music, which will appear soon. She holds degrees from Maryville College and the Ph. D. degree from the University of Notre Dame.

8. Affective Approach: Five members of the IUSB Division of Education presented "A Multi-Dimensional Affective Approach to Educational Psychology" at the St. Louis Regional Convention of the American Personnel and Guidance Association this week. Chairman of the presentation was Dr. James A. Yutzy, coordinator of field experiences for the division. Participants were Dr. J. Vincent Peterson, Dr. Yutzy, Dr. Richmond E. Calvin, Dr. Pearl A. Buckland, and Dr. Richard J. Tirman.

They discussed IUSB's "Introduction to Teaching-Human Development and Learning," (F100-P280) approach to introducing undergraduates to teaching and educational psychology courses.

9. Faculty Notes: Dr. Jonelle M. Farrow, Psychology, has been notified by the State Board of Examiners in Psychology that she has received certification for private practice as a psychologist in the State of Indiana.

Dr. Patrick J. Furlong, History, spoke on the topic "Patriot Mob before the American Revolution" at St. Mary's College Monday. The lecture was sponsored by the St. Mary's History Department.

Dr. Roger P. Hamburg, Political Science, attended a National Security Conference Seminar at Indiana University-Purdue University-Indianapolis, last Friday. The conferees examined materials on national security policy and heard presentations from people prominent in that field.
