Exploring Latin America through Electronic Resources and Music:

A Workshop for College Faculty in the State of Indiana

Especially designed for college faculty from institutions across Indiana, this one-day workshop aims to promote the use of the Internet as a tool for instruction and research in Latin American topics. Eighteen faculty members from both private and public institutions have confirmed participation in this event, including representation from Ball State, Butler, DePauw, Earlham College, University of Evansville, Indiana State, IU South Bend, and Wabash College.

This workshop is sponsored by the Center for Latin American and Caribbean Studies at Indiana University Bloomington (CLACS). Indiana University is designated a Title VI National Resource Center in Latin American Studies by the U.S. Dept. of Education. As part of its mission, IU encourages regional colleges and universities from the state of Indiana to incorporate Latin American Studies into their curriculum.

The workshop has been organized by Luis A. González, Librarian for Latin American Studies, Spanish & Portuguese, and Latino Studies at IU Bloomington.

2007 William Evans Jenkins Librarian Award, IUB

Eileen Fry and Carolyn Walters have been named the winners of the 2007 William Evans Jenkins Librarian Award.

Named for IU's chief librarian from 1904-1932, the William Evans Jenkins Librarian Award recognizes the outstanding professional contributions of a present or former librarian and is awarded by the Bloomington Library Faculty Council.

The award will be presented to the co-winners at a meeting of the Bloomington Library Faculty on May 1st, 2-4 p.m., Staff Lounge, Wells Library. They will also be recognized at the annual Recognition and Retirement Ceremony, April 19th, Reference Reading Room, Wells Library, 2:30-4 p.m.

Eileen Fry has served the IUB Libraries as the Fine Arts Slide Librarian since 1975. She has demonstrated significant contributions to the library profession which reflects achievement in librarianship at Indiana University and has also had significant influence on the operations of the Indiana University Libraries. Her commitment to DIDO (Digital Image Database Online) is an outstanding exemplar of her initiative. Indiana University's Slide Library webpage is recognized as a model imitated by other institutions and information shared by Eileen is used nationally and internationally. She has a reputation as a pioneer slide librarian. She works tirelessly with faculty and students to teach them to access and use image technology. She teaches, publishes, and presents on a wide range of professional interests, and has mentored colleagues in the field. She is a sought after and inspiring lecturer in Fine Arts and SLIS classes, and has shared her expertise with interns, inspiring many generations of faculty and librarians. She has presented at conferences and on panels at national conferences 32 times, in addition to publishing a book and articles in her field. Over the years, she made important contributions to the vocabularies used for art, artist, and geographic names, including in her *Concordance of Ancient Site Names*, co-edited with Maryly Snow, which was a source of many important new entries.

Her service in the Visual Resources Association (VRA) and the Art Libraries Society/North America (ARLIS/NA) is notable. She is recognized and praised by her colleagues for implementing national standards for the Cataloging of Cultural Objects (CCO) and is considered one of the national authorities regarding the development of systems for the cataloging and subject analysis of visual images. She currently serves as Co-Chair and webmaster for the VRA Data Standards Committee, one example of her many leadership roles. Eileen is currently serving on the joint ARLIS/VRA Summer Educational Institute Task Force and has been instrumental in planning for the institute to be held on the Indiana University campus for 2007.

Among her many creative projects is her research project on the Image Archive of Professor Molly Faries, Indiana University and Rijksuniversitat Groningen, Netherlands, for which she constructed finding aids and linked all visual and written documents in the archive, housed at the Rijksbureau voor Kunsthistorische Documentatie in the Hague.

Her colleagues have called her work on DIDO "brilliant" and the Fine Arts Slide Library "top notch." Sarah Burns, Ruth N. Halls Professor, IUB Fine Arts, stated "because of her superb leadership and vision that IUB now has one of the most advanced visual resource collections of any university."

Carolyn Walters served the IUB Libraries in many positions since 1992, as Acting Head, Journalism Library 1992-1993; Librarian for Halls of Residence Libraries and Undergraduate Collections, 1987-95, 1996-97; Acting Director of Collection Development, 1996-1998; Acting Head, Undergraduate Library Services, 1997-1998; Coordinator, Main Library Research and Instruction Unit, 1997-1999; Head, Undergraduate Library Services, 1998-2003; Head, Information Commons/Undergraduate Services, 2003-2004; Director of Public Services, 2004-2005; Executive Associate Dean and Director of Public Services, 2005-2006; and Executive Associate Dean, 2006-present.

Carolyn has made a professional contribution which has had significant influence on the operations of the Indiana University Libraries and also a significant professional contribution which has earned the recognition of the Indiana University community. She has had a tremendous impact on the Bloomington Campus, advocating for undergraduate student library services, and mentoring many students and inspiring them and her colleagues with her passion for librarianship and dedication to service. She has shared her knowledge with service and presentations at the state and national levels. Carolyn's vision is demonstrated by her development and advocacy for the Information Commons, which is a model for library services for administrators, librarians, and faculty from around the world. Especially notable is her development of partnerships with complementary service units on campus, including the Student Technology Centers, Library Information Technology Services, Adaptive Technology Services, the Writing Tutorial Services, and UITS. Her work, innovation, and dedication has had a huge impact in making the Libraries a supportive and welcoming place for students 24 hours a day.

As Director of Public Services, Carolyn established groups such as the Public Services Team, Public Services Council, and the Library Space Committee, and encouraged librarians to engage in outreach and marketing. She

brought librarians and staff together to develop a campus wide library orientation initiative for new students and faculty, and to create a marketing initiative.

As Executive Associate Dean, she is instrumental in guiding the Libraries in this transformational time. She has brought users' needs to the center of the decision making process, involving input from faculty and students, user testing, focus groups, surveys, and assessment. She supports change and innovations that make library resources, collections, and facilities more accessible to users.

Carolyn's contributions to the IUB University community have been outstanding. In her service to the Council on Student Affairs, Carolyn represented the IU Libraries, sharing insights and concerns with the broader campus community. She has also served for many years as a Hearing Commission Member, considering cases in which students had been charged by the Dean of Students for alleged disciplinary violations. Her leadership and commitment is also demonstrated by her service as Co-Chair of the three of the campus' four anti-harassment teams for responding to bias-motivated incidents. Finally, she made significant contributions to the revision of the Code of Student Rights, Responsibilities, and Conduct. Carolyn was the recipient of the 2002 Michael Gordon Faculty Award given by the Division of Student Affairs for outstanding contributions by a faculty member to student life on the Bloomington campus, and was the first librarian to receive the award. In 2006, Carolyn was accepted for the distinguished I.U. Leadership Development Program for young faculty.

In her many years of service and teaching on campus, Carolyn has been recognized as a superb instructor, winning the 1999 SLIS Teaching Excellence Award for adjunct faculty. Her work to support library instruction and use for business courses, including the case competition in Z302, Managing Behavior in Organizations, has been called incredible, by Keith GeLarden Dayton, Professor, Kelly School of Business.

Carolyn's service to the Indiana Library Federation is notable, serving as member and Co-Chair for many years of the ILF Legislative Committee, and also serving as the 1995 ILF Annual Conference Program Committee Co-Chair. Past President of ILF, and Co-Chair of the Legislative Committee, Wendy Phillips, called Carolyn a "tireless advocate," and "first to volunteer, modeling the way for students and colleagues." She praises her commitment and the positive impact Carolyn has had on the library community in Indiana.
