1. United Way: The United Way campaign in IUSB gets under way today. Faculty will be contacted by divisional offices, and staff through the University Relations office.

Please consider a couple of things when you receive your pledge card. First, IUSB is an inextricable part of the South Bend community, with obligations and responsibilities to the community. Second, this fund drive is the only one conducted in the university during the year.

All cards should be returned to divisional offices or the University Relations office by two weeks from today.

2. State of University: In his State of the University address on October 5, President John W. Ryan forecast the rapid emergence of IU's regional campuses as "separate organizational components" in the IU confederation.

The current academic year, Dr. Ryan said, will be one of restructuring the IU administrative system. As the system continues to evolve, he predicted, "specific regional campuses will emerge as separate organizational components as they mature. This will take place rather rapidly for most of the campuses.

"What is now referred to as regional campus administration, directed by a chancellor, will disappear from the organizational structure," the President said, "and the functions currently performed will be absorbed elsewhere. Individual regional campus chancellors will then assume roles comparable to IU-Bloomington and IU-Purdue-Indianapolis."

Where university-wide services of an operating nature appear to be more feasible, practical, or economical than local operations, they will be retained, President Ryan said.

Concurrently with the restructuring there will be a re-examination of "the grand objectives of this university, to the end that we reconfirm the priorities we will follow in the use of resources of brainpower, money, and time." Dr. Ryan cited six areas in which progress has been made and is continuing: opportunity for minority and disadvantaged students; student financial aid; equal opportunity for women; the 150th Birthday Fund drive; development of physical facilities, and a management study of the IU system.

On the subject of physical facilities, he conceded that IU has not yet accomplished the target space figures considered essential. But, he said, "with completion of the projects now funded by the General Assembly, each regional campus will be able to provide the essential needs of its student body in permanent or semi-permanent buildings." He cited the \$6 million addition to Northside Hall at IUSB, and expressed hope for an early start on a free-standing library and a student union building at this campus.

3. Meet Pete: Peter W. Yoder has assumed the position of director of alumni relations for regional campuses of Indiana University. His home base will be the house at 1005 S. 20th St. on the IUSB campus.

Mr. Yoder holds the Bachelor of Science degree in accounting from Indiana University-Bloomington, where he graduated last January. He is a native of Goshen, Indiana.

He says the welcome mat is out in the alumni house, and he invites faculty and staff members to stop by and say hello.

4. Summer Faculty Fellowships: Through the Office of the Vice-President for Research and Advanced Studies, Indiana University will again be offering fellowships, effective in the summer of 1972, for the support of regular faculty members who will not be teaching and who wish to devote full time to research or creative work in the arts.

These fellowships will be primarily for persons holding the lower professorial ranks. They may not be awarded for research leading to a dissertation. Recipients must not hold any teaching or other service-rendering appointments at any time throughout the summer, and they must be planning to continue at Indiana University through 1972/73.

The stipends will be \$1,200 for an instructor and assistant professor, \$1,400 for an associate professor, and \$1,600 for a professor. For fellows who are granted supplemental income from other sources, the award payments may be adjusted to furnish payments of \$2,000.

Application forms may be obtained in the office of the Dean of Faculties, and should be returned to that office no later than November 15, 1971, for transmission to Bloomington to meet a December 1 deadline. Each application should be supported by a letter from the departmental chairman.

It is expected that awards will be announced beginning December 15.

5. Recycle Glass: Faculty and staff are reminded by IUSB's Environmental Studies Committee that a glass collection center is maintained in the garage at the Special Services building, 2102 Pleasant St. Bottles and jars should be rinsed. Caps and metal rings must be removed, but not labels. The glass will be recycled.

The center also has collection facilities for IBM cards and read-out sheets.

The Environmental Studies Committee will hold a meeting at 2 p.m. Sunday, October 17, in N115.

6. Flagellar Motility: Dr. Stuart Goldstein, assistant professor of zoology at the University of Minnesota, will discuss "Laser Microbeam Studies of Flagellar Motility" at 1 p.m. today in G201, under the auspices of the IUSB Biology Department. The talk is open to faculty and students.

7. Faculty Activities: A resume of "A Study of the Measured Readability Level of Selected Intermediate Grade Social Studies Textbooks," by Dr. Charles R. DuVall, Education, appears in the September issue of Research in Education.

John D. Silha, Business Administration, has been appointed to the board of directors of the Economic Development Corporation of South Bend by Mayor Lloyd M. Allen. A major purpose of the organization is to provide funding and assistance to minority businesses.

Three faculty members of the Division of Arts and Sciences will present papers at the fall meeting of the Indiana Academy of Sciences at Earlham College, Richmond, on Oct. 29. Dr. Lawrence L. Garber, Chemistry, will discuss "Some New Approaches to Teaching Chemistry for Non-Science Majors"; Dr. Thomas Joseph, Biology, will discuss "Coccidial Immunity Studies in the Grey Squirrel," and Dr. Philip S. Marcus, Mathematics, will speak on "Calculus without Differentials."

Four faculty members in the Division of Business and Economics will present papers at the Indiana Academy of the Social Sciences conference in the Notre Dame Center for Continuing Education on Oct. 29. John D. Silha, Business Administration, will discuss "Financial Structure of the Minority Firm"; Dr. John R. Svanda, Business Administration, will talk about "Personal Problems of the Black Firm"; Donald G. Cline, Accounting, will discuss "Control Problems of the Black Firm," and Robert N. Robinson, Accounting, will speak of "Tax Incentives and Environmental Control."
