1. Elkhart, Toll Free: A new telephone line with an Osceola exchange has been installed at IUSB. It allows toll-free calls to and from the communities of Osceola, Elkhart, Bristol, Dunlap, Wakarusa, Goshen, and Middlebury.

To call in to the University from one of those communities, dial 679-4216. To dial from the University to a number in any of the communities, dial 7 for a dial-tone, then dial the seven-digit number sought.

Only one line is available to handle these calls. If it is busy, wait a few moments and try again.

2. Energy Expert: Dr. Samuel J. Tuthill, state geologist of Iowa and director of the Iowa State Geological Survey, will discuss the energy crisis at 4 p.m. Monday in N104. Faculty and students are invited to the lecture.

Faculty also are invited to a coffee-hour conversation with Dr. Tuthill at 3 p.m. Monday in the Northside ground-level faculty lounge.

Dr. Tuthill's lecture is sponsored by the Addison L. Roache Memorial Lectureship of Indiana University. A veteran of several geological expeditions to Alaska under grants from the National Science Foundation, Dr. Tuthill conducted geological and ecological research related to glaciation and the effects of the Alaskan earthquake of 1964. He also serves as chairman of a task force on Midwest Energy Requirements and Environmental Protection, established by the Midwest Governor's Conference.

He will examine the role of government and individuals in the energy situation during his lecture, and will discuss problems involved in solving the crisis. He also will discuss the balances between the use and conservation of energy.
