Remaking the Department of History

The past year brought significant transformations to the Department of History. It was a time in which some very valued members of our faculty decided to retire, and it was a period of an unusually high level of searches and hires. In December, James Diehl retired after a distinguished career at Indiana in the field of modern German history. Diehl joined our department in 1973 after receiving a doctorate from the University of California at Berkeley the year before. His reputation as a trainer of a large group of doctoral students who continually secured teaching positions was well established, and many returned in December 2003 to give him a fond tribute at his retirement dinner. Diehl's books included *The Thanks of the Fatherland: German Veterans After the Second World War*, which was published by the University of North Carolina Press in 1993.

Phyllis Martin also joined Diehl in completing her professional career at Indiana. Martin was a vital member not only of the department but also of the African history field. She obtained her doctorate from the School of Oriental and African Studies at the University of London in 1970 and became a part-time assistant professor of history in 1972. In 1999, the College of Arts and Sciences named her the Ruth N. Halls Professor of History. As with James Diehl, she was an outstanding trainer of doctoral students in her field. Her book *Leisure and Society in Colonial Brazzaville* was published in 1995 by Cambridge University Press and won an award from the French Colonial Historical Society as the best book on French colonial history for that year.

Joanne Meyerowitz, who was both professor in the department and the editor of the *Journal of American History*, elected to take a position at Yale University. Meyerowitz was a central figure in the department's field in the history of gender and sexuality.

Her 2002 book, *How Sex Changed: A History of Transsexuality in the United States*, was published to wide acclaim by Harvard University Press.

Fortunately, many of our searches produced an infusion of superb newcomers. In December 2004, Mark Roseman assumed the Glazer Chair in Jewish History. Roseman teaches courses on the Holocaust and is the author of *A Past in Hiding: Memory and Survival in Nazi Germany*. Four new scholars have accepted offers to come to Bloomington beginning the fall term of 2004. They cover such diverse fields as African history, Indian history, Latino history, and Middle Eastern history. Marissa Moorman earned her PhD from the University of Minnesota earlier this year and specializes in the history of Angola. Her dissertation explored the relationship between popular music and nationalism in that country. Michael Dodson left a position at Cambridge University in England to come to Indiana. Dodson is a specialist in the history of India and in the study of the British Empire. He completed a dissertation at Cambridge in 2003, and his book, *An Empire of Understanding: Indian Pandits and British Orientalism*, will be published by Cambridge University Press. John Nieto-Phillips will bring an expertise in the study of Latino-Americans. He holds a graduate degree from UCLA and has already published *The Language of Blood: The Making of Spanish American Identity in New Mexico 1850s-1930s* (University of New Mexico Press, 2003). Finally, James Grehan joined both the departments of History and Near Eastern Languages and Cultures. The holder of a doctorate from the University of Texas, Grehan is completing a book titled *Everyday Life and Economic Culture in 18th-Century Damascus*.

The department also conducted searches this year in African-American history and

for editors for both the *Journal of American History* and the *American Historical Review*. The *JAH* search will be continued in 2004-05. Rob Schneider, however, has accepted an offer to join our department as a professor and editor of the *American Historical Review*. Schneider, the holder of a doctorate from the University of Michigan, is a specialist on French cultural history, and his books include *The Ceremonial City: Toulouse Observed, 1738-1780*, which was published by Princeton University Press in 1995. He will move to Bloomington in the summer of 2005. Schneider will be joined next summer by Khalil Muhammad. Muhammad's doctorate is from Rutgers University, and his dissertation in African-American history explores debates over African-American criminality in the cities during the first decades of the 20th century.

Around the department

Elliott named Halls Professor of History

Dyan Elliott was named the Ruth N. Halls Professor of History at Indiana University in July 2004. Elliott is a distinguished scholar of sexuality in the Middle Ages. She has held fellowships from the National Humanities Institute and the Princeton Institute for Advanced Studies. Her published volumes include *Spiritual Marriage: Sexual Abstinence in Medieval Wedlock*, which was issued in 1995 by Princeton University Press. This year, Princeton published her volume *Proving Women: Female Mysticism and Inquisitional Practice in Late Medieval Europe*.

The Halls professorship is the result of a generous gift to the College of Arts and Sciences by Ruth N. Halls. Halls, who graduated from Indiana University in 1919 as a classics major, grew up in Lawrence County, Ind. When she died in Santa Barbara, Calif., in 1990, she left her entire estate of \$11 million to the College as a remembrance of the joy she experienced in studying distant places and past times.

IU honors Gould and Thelen

Indiana University recognized the special contributions of Jeffrey Gould and David Thelen during the past year. Gould was named Rudy Professor of History, and Thelen was awarded the title of Distinguished Professor of History.

Gould, who is also the director of the Center for Latin American and Caribbean Studies at IUB, has

focused his research on the history of Central America. His books include *To Lead as Equals: Rural Protest and Political Consciousness*

in Chinandega, Nicaragua (1912–1979), which was published in 1990 by the University of North Carolina Press, and *To Die in This Way: Nicaraguan Indians and the Myth of Mestizaje, 1880–1965*, which Duke University Press issued in 1998.

Gould has held fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation and the Rockefeller Foundation.

Thelen, who edited the *Journal of American History* from 1985 to 1999, has published widely in modern American

history. In 1998, he co-authored with Roy Rosenzweig *The Presence of the Past: Popular Uses of History in American Life*,

which was published by Columbia University Press. In 1996, the University of Chicago Press released his book *Becoming Citizens in the Age of Television: How Americans Challenged the Media and Seized Political Initiative During the Iran–Contra Debate*. He has held fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation and the Spencer Foundation.

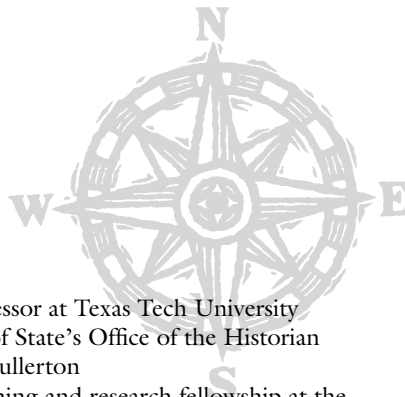

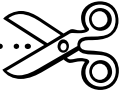
