Something Old and Something New

Indiana University at South Bend is part of the statewide system of public higher education known as Indiana University. There are eight campuses in the system, serving the major population centers of Indiana. Besides South Bend, campuses are located in Bloomington, Indianapolis, Fort Wayne, Gary, Kokomo, Richmond, and Jeffersonville-New Albany.

IUSB is the third largest campus in the system (and the seventh largest college campus, public or private, in the state). The South Bend campus is located at 1825 Northside Blvd., east of

downtown South Bend. It overlooks a picturesque stretch of the St. Joseph River.

IUSB's growing facilities include a 100,000-volume library, modern classrooms and science laboratories, a spacious auditorium-stage complex, and studios for the fine and performing arts—all supplemented by the resources of Indiana University as a system. IUSB students have access to the much larger collection of books and audio-visual materials at the Bloomington campus, to system-wide computer facilities, and to the economic benefits of system-wide purchasing and fee structures. The South Bend campus is tied to other state university campuses by a closed circuit instructional television system which allows outstanding teachers to reach many more students than a single classroom can contain.

Indiana University boasts more than a century and a half of tradition. At the IUSB campus, that tradition blends with the vigor and flexibility of a much younger institution. Students can move easily among the campuses of the I.U. system in response to their individual educational needs. A diploma from IUSB is a diploma from Indiana University, and the system is tied together by a single president, one board of trustees, and a common set of standards for quality of faculty and instruction.

Curriculum and Faculty

Though part of a statewide system, each campus of Indiana University has its own unique qualities and personality. IUSB's goal is to serve the higher education needs of more than half a million people in the Michiana area. Curricula are tailored to those needs, yet are rooted firmly in the traditional educational values that distinguish true higher education.

IUSB is a comprehensive, degree-granting institution which anticipates continued growth to approximately 8,000 students in the next few years. Bachelor's-degree programs are offered in the arts and sciences and in music.

Bachelor's and master's level programs are offered in business and economics, and in education. Sub-baccalaureate degree programs are available in para-professional fields, including medicine, dentistry, and education. Non-degree, continuing education courses are also offered at IUSB.

The resident faculty, core of the teaching staff, reflects the high standards of Indiana University. It is supplemented by an associate faculty whose members are drawn from qualified business and professional people in the community and from other colleges and universities.



Commuter Campus

Indiana University at South Bend is a commuter college with no on-campus housing for students. Most IUSB students live in their own homes, although many apartments and similar accommodations are located near the campus.

Students come to the IUSB campus from within a range of about 50 miles from South Bend. The distinction between full-time and part-time students is not as sharp on the commuter campus as

it is on the residential campus. Many IUSB students work at full- or part-time jobs, and the age range of students is far broader than at traditional residential campuses. Most students find that the age "mix" of students at IUSB has, in and of itself, a positive educational value.

Parking facilities are available at the campus, and bus service is available between the campus and downtown South Bend.



Admission

Applications for admission to IUSB may be filed after the completion of the junior year in high school. Early admission may be granted to superior students who have completed required tests and are taking the necessary senior subjects. Admission applications should be filed by December 1 for the spring semester, by April 15 for the summer sessions, and by July 1 for the fall semester.

Admission to undergraduate status is available to any Indiana resident who (1) graduates from a commissioned or accredited high school, (2) ranks in the upper half of his class, and (3) makes above-average scores on the College Board Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or the American College Assessment Program Test (ACT). Out-of-state freshmen are selected from applicants whose rank and

test scores are in the top fourth of high school seniors.

The College Entrance Examination Board Achievement Tests are recommended for placement purposes in foreign language and in chemistry. They are also recommended for students who have superior achievement in other subject areas, to determine eligibility for advanced credit or exemption from required courses. It is recommended that achievement tests be taken during December, January, March, or May at the local high school or test center.

Up to 30 semester hours of credit can be obtained through the use of the College Level Examination Program (CLEP). Information about this program is available in the Office of Admissions.

University Division

All students entering Indiana University at South Bend from high school go into the University Division. The Division provides guidance and counseling to promote a successful transition from high school to college.

The University Division provides orientation sessions for all entering freshmen. During orientation, students receive general information about the University and its policies, academic counseling, program planning assistance, and registration information.

When a student has earned credit in 26 semester-hours of course work with an average of C or above, he becomes eligible to certify to an upper division. A student may elect to remain in the University Division, as an exploratory student, for up to two years. As long as he remains in the Division, he has the freedom to be uncommitted to a major course of studies and to sample the curricula in a variety of educational fields.



Visits to Campus

Prospective students and their families are welcome to visit the IUSB campus. Tour arrangements can be made through the University Relations office.

Counseling

Academic counseling is provided through the divisions and departments of the University and through the Admissions Office for incoming students. Confidential personal and vocational counseling services are offered by the office of the Dean of Student Services.

Fees

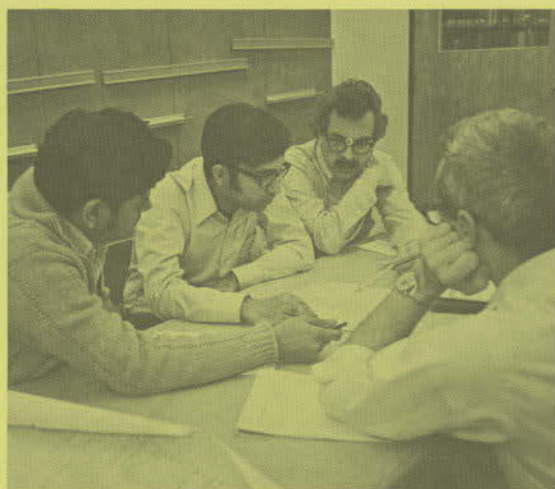
It costs approximately \$850 for an Indiana resident to attend Indiana University at South Bend for one academic year. That estimate covers the fees for 30 semester-hours of study, plus books and supplies. It does not cover living or travel or other personal expenses a student may incur.

Indiana residents currently pay \$20 per credit hour in University fees at the undergraduate level. Out-of-state students pay \$40 an hour. Graduate fees are \$25 per credit hour in-state, and \$50 out-of-state. New students are charged a \$15 application fee, and other special fees may be charged for laboratory courses, late enrollment, and student activities.

Financial Assistance

Financial aid is available to students who can demonstrate need. Because funds are limited, a student's entire need may not be met by gift aid. Several types of assistance, such as scholarships, loans, and employment earnings, may have to be "packaged" to meet total requirements.

IUSB maintains a Financial Aids office to assist students with financial need. Applications for most types of financial assistance are available from high school counselors for filing in the fall of the senior year.



Student Activities

Extracurricular activities are an integral part of student life at IUSB. There is an active student government and a variety of academic clubs, fraternities, sororities, and similar organizations.

Intramural and extramural activities are open to all interested students. The

IUSB basketball team plays a 20-plus game schedule each season.

Students publish a weekly campus newspaper and a semi-annual literary magazine.

Students also operate a day-care center for children of married students.

Music

A great many musical programs are offered at IUSB in the course of the academic year, including recitals, orchestral and choral concerts, and operatic performances. Many of the events are open to students without cost.

Performance opportunities in University-sponsored musical groups are available to students.

Theatre

Theatre IU at South Bend presents at least four major stage performances a year, providing ample opportunities for viewing and participating in theatre.

Lectures

Several lecture series are offered at the extracurricular level through the year. Outside lecturers are often sponsored by Student Government or academic departments.

College Credit for High School Students

Outstanding and mature high school students can earn college credit while they are still going to high school. To be eligible to take courses at IUSB, a student must have completed six semesters of high school work with a B average

and be recommended by a high school principal or counselor.

Students can enroll in summer sessions or in a regular semester. Credit earned will apply to the student's college career.

Continuing Education

Directed primarily to the adult needs of the community, the IUSB Program of Continuing Education offers a broad range of non-credit courses in such areas of interest as the home, the family, communications, the arts, and professional development. Some credit courses are available through the Continuing Education Program.

History of IUSB

The first Indiana University classes in South Bend were taught in 1922. During the Depression, the University recognized the need for a program which would enable students in the South Bend-Mishawaka area to take freshman and sophomore course work while living at home. In 1933, a full two-year program was offered to approximately 200 students.

In 1940, the South Bend extension of Indiana University got its first full-time director. By 1950, enrollment had risen to 1,370 students in credit and non-credit courses.

In the early days, courses were taught in Central High School, mostly at night. In 1961, the South Bend Center moved

to its present location. Dr. Lester M. Wolfson, the present chancellor, assumed the directorship in 1964. Programs, enrollment, and faculty have expanded rapidly since that time, given impetus by the decision of the University and the State Legislature to turn regional campuses into four-year, degree-granting institutions in order to bring higher education opportunities within commuting distance of most citizens of Indiana.

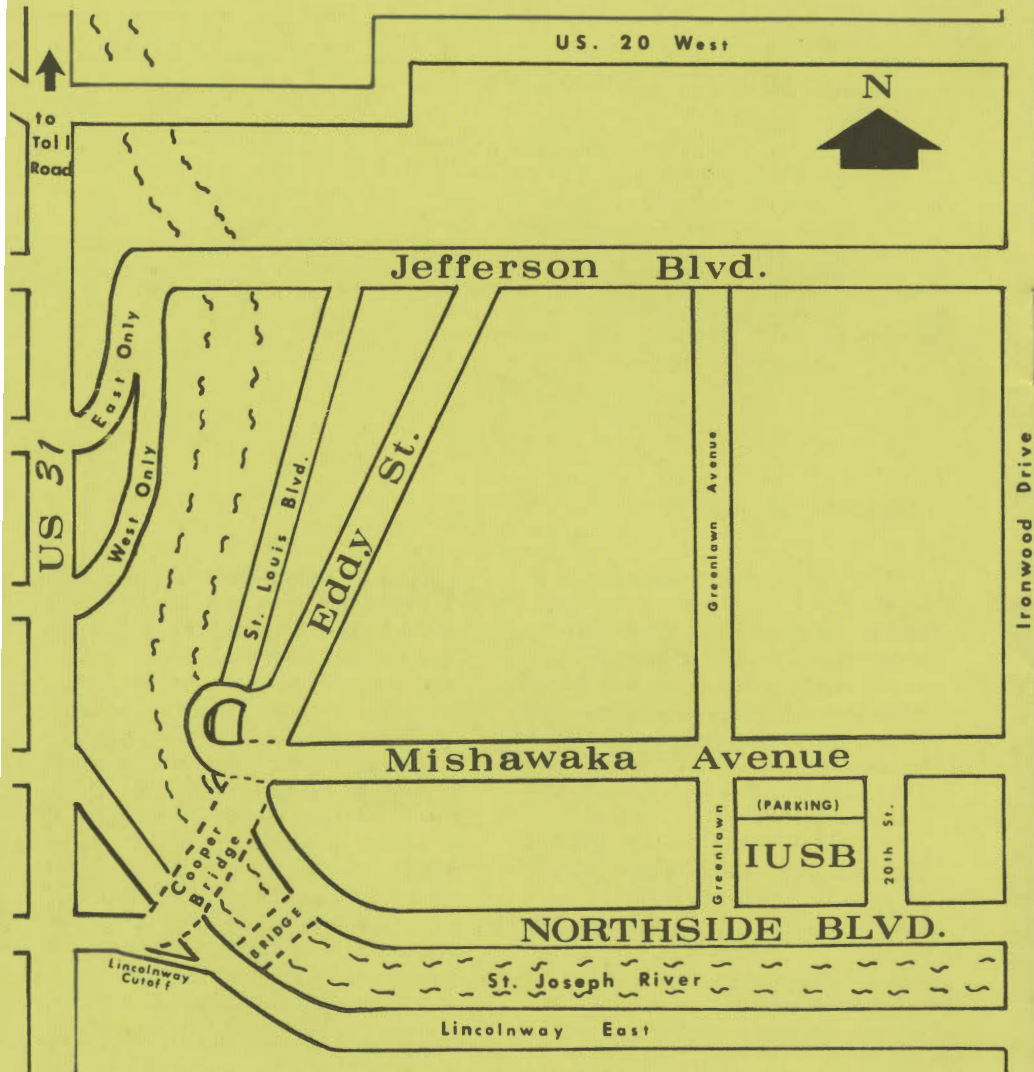
IUSB graduated its first class of 30 men and women in 1967. By 1972, the graduating class had grown to 710. Enrollment tripled within a decade, rising from 2,000 credit students in 1964 to nearly 6,000 by 1972.
