1. Computer Research Service: The IUSB Computer Services Department, located in Room 0067 of Northside West, has a consulting service available for faculty and graduate assistants who are using the computer facilities for research projects.

The consulting service will encompass Fortran programming, systems control, uses of utilities and packaged programs, computer-aided instruction (when available), and other pertinent areas.

The consulting for Fortran programming will assume the user to be capable of programming and will be offered as an aid in general design and debugging (interpretation of compiler-execution diagnostics and location of error(s)). Consultation in the area of systems control will include aid in writing "JCL," aid in improving the use of "JCL" and systems control in an attempt to optimize turnaround, and, if sufficient demand is shown, workshops in "JCL" and SCOPE, when the latter is available. Consulting on utilities and packages programs will include an attempt to choose the proper program to be applied to a problem and assistance in setting up data and control cards. Computer-aided instruction is expected to become available here within the year. Technical assistance will be provided to instructors who wish to develop courses using the facility.

Steven J. Holmes will serve as the consultant. He will be available weekday afternoons by appointment. He has been engaged primarily in research and administrative programming, and he will continue to do some research programming on a reduced scale.

The new service is a result of a motion passed by the IUSB Computer Users Committee.

2. Islam, Bangladesh: The director of the India Institute of Islamic Studies in New Delhi, Prof. S. A. Ali, will give two lectures at IUSB today. He will discuss "Islam in India" at 3:30 p.m. and "The Creation of Bangladesh" at 8 p.m. Both lectures will be given in Room 152, Northside West.

Prof. Ali is currently a visiting lecturer at Goshen College. He is associate editor of the journal "Studies in Islam" and the author of several books in Urdu and English. Student Government, the Department of History, and the Office of Continuing Education are sponsoring the lectures.

3. AAUP Speaker: C. L. Haslam, associate secretary of the American Association of University Professors, will discuss tenure and collective bargaining at 1:30 p.m. Thursday in the Northside West lecture hall. IUSB and area AAUP members are invited.

4. Seminar in Related Arts: Dr. Bryan E. Lindsay, associate professor of humanities at Converse College, Spartanburg, S. C., will lead a seminar in "Related Arts in the Schools: A Creative Approach" at 3:30 p.m. Thursday in Room 066 of Northside Hall.

Sponsored by the South Bend Community School Corp. and the IUSB Office of Continuing Education, the seminar is designed for students in fine arts, music, and theatre who may be thinking of pursuing careers in education.

5. 'Cell, Sex, and Man': The spring Faculty Lecture Series will open at 8:15 p.m. Thursday in Northside West 152 with a lecture entitled "Cell, Sex, and Man" by Dr. Romesh C. Mehra, Biology. He will discuss genetic engineering and its present and future applications. The illustrated talk will survey recent findings about the structure and function of the cellular organelles, with special emphasis on the nucleus, or control center, of the cell. A coffee hour will follow the talk.
6. Right to Read: Dr. Roma Gans, professor emeritus, Columbia Teachers College, will open a reading workshop for parents and teachers at 7:30 p.m. Friday with an address on "Perspectives in Reading" in the Northside West lecture hall.

Workshop sessions will be held on the campus throughout the day Saturday. The program was planned in conjunction with "Right to Read Week in St. Joseph Valley" and is sponsored by the IUSB Division of Education, the IUSB Office of Continuing Education, and the St. Joseph Valley Council of the International Reading Association. There will be admission charges of \$1 for the address by Dr. Gans and for the workshops.

7. Personnel Committee: All IUSB faculty are invited to attend an open forum sponsored by the Academic Personnel Committee at 9:30 a.m. next Wednesday, March 7, in Northside West 152. The Clipper proposals regarding tenure will be discussed.
8. Glasser Visit: William Glasser, M.D., the noted author, educator, and psychiatrist, will be on the IUSB campus on Thursday, March 22. He will meet with interested faculty members from 9 to 10:15 a.m.; with students from 10:30 to 11:45, and with local school administrators and counselors from 1:30 to 3 p.m.
9. Candidates Sought: Mansfield State College, Mansfield, Pa., is seeking to fill the position of vice-president for academic affairs by July 1. Qualifications include an earned doctorate, teaching and academic experience, commitment to research, ability in managing budgetary and fiscal resources, and understanding of problems related

to negotiated faculty contracts. The college is one of 14 state-supported multi-purpose institutions with a broad curriculum and an enrollment of 3,100.

10. Overseas Study: Faculty members and students interested in Overseas Study Programs are invited to meet with W. T. K. Nugent, I.U. associate dean for Overseas Study, and others who have directed or coordinated I.U. overseas programs, at 11 a.m. Monday in N156.

The visitors will describe I.U. programs and answer questions about international educational experiences.

11. Faculty Notes: Dr. Gregory R. Baur, Education, is the author of "Children and the Learning of Mathematics," an article published in the December, 1972, Indiana Mathematics Newsletter, a publication of the Indiana Council of Mathematics Teachers.

Dr. Gerald O. Dudley, Education, was developer and moderator of a program on "Pupil Record Data for Alternative Systems of Education" in mid-February at the Indiana Personnel Guidance Association meeting in Indianapolis. Dr. J. Vincent Peterson, Education, served as a presenter on the panel; his topic was "Pupil Information Use in the Free School Climate."

Dr. Patrick J. Furlong, History, reviewed the book Foundations of American Independence, 1763-1815, by J. R. Pole, in The Journal of Southern History for February, 1973.

The Center, located at North Carolina State University, Raleigh, is funded through the National Institute for Education and is charged with the mission of research and development in occupational education.
