1. Dedication: President John W. Ryan will give the main address at Thursday's dedication ceremony for Northside West, starting at 8:15 p.m. in the new lecture hall.

All faculty are encouraged to attend. Although the platform party will be robed, academic attire is not required for faculty.

Chancellor Wolfson and RCA Chancellor Bowman will speak briefly during the ceremony, as will Student Government Vice-President Les Edgerton. Jeanne S. Miller, IU Trustee, will accept the building from the architect.

Members of the Graduating Class Council of 1973 will lead tours of Northside West throughout the evening, starting at 6 p.m.

A reception by the IU Alumni Association will be held in the Northside faculty lounge following the program. Faculty are invited to attend.

2. Dedicatory Concert: IUSB's Contemporary Chamber Ensemble will perform a dedication concert in the Northside West lecture hall at 8:15 p.m. today. The Ensemble, conducted by Dr. Barton K. McLean, will give a program of modern and futuristic music.

3. Buy Bonds: Forms authorizing payroll deduction for U.S. Savings Bonds will be enclosed with the next pay checks to faculty and staff. Those interested in starting or altering U.S. Savings Bonds programs should return the authorization card to Mrs. Wentzel in the Business Office.

Those already on a payroll deduction program at IU need not re-authorize the University unless they want to change the amount of deduction.

Information about U.S. Bond interest rates and types of bonds may be obtained from Mrs. Wentzel.

4. Lecture Cancelled: A lecture by Dr. Romesh C. Mehra, Biology, on "Evolution: Genetics and Man" has been cancelled. Originally scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 30, it will be re-scheduled in the spring semester.
5. Reserve 'Reviews': Faculty and staff members are urged by Editors Judi Trezona and Robert S. Michael to reserve copies of the IUSB Review, a new publication which replaces the old Titan yearbook, before the end of the fall term. Copies are \$2 apiece. Orders will be handled by Student Government and the Review staff. Sales to students will begin at spring registration in January.

Walsworth Publishing Co., Inc., of Marcelline, Mo., has been selected as the printer for the IUSB Review. The company is also printing yearbooks this year for the University of Notre Dame, St. Mary's College, and the Air Force Academy.

A representative of the printing firm will work with Editors Trezona and Michael in preparing the Review for publication.

6. Deadline Reminder: Sabbatical leave applications for the 1973/74 academic year are due in the Chancellor's Office by Dec. 11.
7. Performance/Discussion: A performance-discussion of 20th-Century vocal music by Soprano Susan Stevens, of Seattle, a 1970 national finalist in the Metropolitan Opera Auditions, will be held at 11:30 a.m. today in NSW 158. Miss Stevens will be assisted by Ronald Morebello, piano; Arthur Follows, cello, and George Opperman, flute.

They will deal with compositions by Charles Ives, James McCray, Igor Stravinsky, Hans Pfitzner, Henry Cowell, and Maurice Ravel.

8. Faculty Notes: The Indiana State Board of Psychological Examiners has notified Dr. Pearl A. Buckland, Education, that, on the basis of an oral and written test, she is certified to do private practice. The "Researchlight" section of the November, 1972, issue of The Reading Teacher reviewed a study by Dr. Buckland entitled "The Effect of Visual Perception Training on Reading Achievement in Low-Readiness First Grade Pupils." And on Nov. 16, Dr. Buckland spoke to the trustees, administrators, and other members of the South Bend Community School Corp. about identification and diagnosis of the educationally handicapped; also on the program was Dr. Carl Rosen, Director of Child Study at Kent State University.

"The Use of Video Transcription Recording Equipment on Field Trips," an article by Dr. Charles R. DuVall, Education, will be published in a future issue of the "Classroom Teacher's 'Idea' Notebook" of Social Education, the Journal of the National Council for the Social Studies.

Robert A. Dubick, Student Activities, was elected to the Executive Committee of the Indiana College Personnel Association at the organization's annual meeting at Taylor University early this month. He will serve for the 1972/73 academic year.

Dr. William M. Gering, Communication Arts, presented a program on Parliamentary Procedure to a Nov. 9 meeting of the Federated Junior Women's Club of South Bend. On Nov. 11, he attended a recognition dinner in Bloomington for the presentation of "Essays in Honor of Hubert G. Heffner" to Prof. Heffner, Distinguished Service Professor Emeritus of Theatre and Dramatic Literature. On Nov. 16, Dr. Gering presented concerns of the Mishawaka Division of Southhold Restorations, Inc., at a meeting of the Mishawaka Lions Club.
