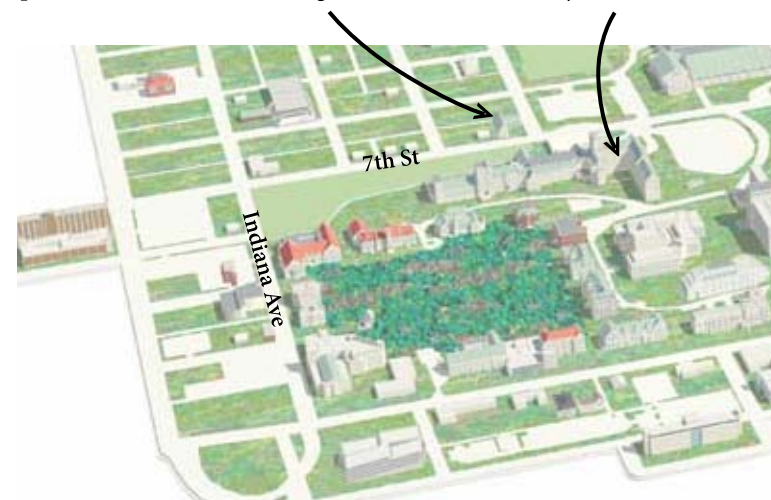

An Invaluable Resource for Outstanding Scholars

The Hutton Honors College provides its students with the intimacy of a small, liberal arts college and the resources of a large and distinguished research university. Graduates have won many prestigious scholarships and fellowships, have studied at the most distinguished graduate and professional schools, are in significant positions ranging from Fortune 500 businesses to nonprofit agencies, and have made their marks as performers, computer experts, doctors, entrepreneurs, lawyers, teachers, writers, scientists, and in many other important roles.

The exceptional Hutton Honors College faculty and students do groundbreaking work in a broad array of disciplines. Creatively designed courses and seminars explore a rich spectrum of topics while offering unique emphasis on international experiences and extraordinary extracurricular involvement.

Faculty members are drawn from the top professors at IU Bloomington. They are innovative teachers who lead inspiring discussions and inform their instruction with their own ongoing research and creative activity. Students in the Hutton Honors College recognize the importance of service and personal growth. They are part of a wider community of action as well as a close community of peers and faculty.

The new home of the Hutton Honors College is a handsome, two-story limestone building comprising 12,500 gross square feet and built in the Collegiate Gothic style. It includes administrative offices, classrooms, lounges for collaborative work and study, a library, and advising offices. Its spacious Great Hall, with floor-to-ceiling windows facing Woodlawn Avenue, will welcome frequent receptions and special events.

The building's exterior consists of a combination of smooth, carved, and rough limestone. Fieldstone walls enclose the brick walks of an English-style garden and the covered porch of the entry, and the gray Vermont slate roof matches that of the adjacent Indiana Memorial Union. Thus, the new building and its grounds embrace the style prevalent on this historic campus.

This beautiful new facility has been made possible by the generosity of Edward L. Hutton, who in 2005 and 2006 provided the funds to build the new home of the Hutton Honors College.

1919–2009

Indiana University lost one of its greatest champions and proudest alumni when Edward L. Hutton passed away on March 4, 2009. Mr. Hutton, a native son of Indiana who became a prominent philanthropist and businessman in Cincinnati, believed wholeheartedly in the work of the honors program that came to bear his name.

“He has had the vision and the generosity that have been crucial for the development of the Hutton Honors College and that will be central to our evolving goals,” IU Bloomington Provost Karen Hanson said when the college was named. “Public universities, including IU, can be the cradle of what Thomas Jefferson called ‘the natural aristocracy,’ the grounds of which are not wealth and privilege but virtue and talents. Mr. Hutton himself is proof of that Jeffersonian faith, achieving what he did through talent and hard work, and now he is giving opportunities for development and achievement to others.”

The chair of the Chemed Corporation in Cincinnati and of Omnicare, Inc., Mr. Hutton grew up near Bloomington in Bedford, Indiana, during the Depression. After earning bachelor's and master's degrees from IU, he served in the U.S. Army in Germany during World War II. After the war, he worked in Berlin in the occupational government's Export/Import Division, negotiating trade agreements with several countries to help rebuild the German economy. “The experience profoundly changed my life, so much so that I've always held that those years of living and working abroad were the key to my development as a person and success as a businessman,” Mr. Hutton said.

After his Army service, Mr. Hutton moved to New York, continuing to work in international trade. In 1951, he joined W. R. Grace & Co., where he became a senior officer and director. Returning to the Midwest in the 1970s, Mr. Hutton became president, chief executive officer, and eventually chairman of Chemed and Omnicare, which are leading pharmaceutical supply companies.

The beneficiary of an IU scholarship and of mentoring from faculty members, Mr. Hutton was generous in funding student scholarships and endowed faculty professorships at IU through the IU Foundation. He also chaired the IU Foundation's volunteer fundraising committee that raised \$23 million for the Herman B Wells Scholars Program in the 1980s. Mr. Hutton received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from IU in 1992 and the IU Foundation's Herman B Wells Visionary award in 2002. In 2003, Mr. Hutton gave \$9 million to IU to establish an endowment for the International Experiences Program. IU subsequently named the program for him. In the fall of 2004, Indiana University Bloomington named its Honors College in his honor.
