1. 2,356 Enrolled: There are 2,356 students enrolled in Summer Session I. The figure compares to 2,233 enrollments in the first summer session a year ago.

Current enrollment breaks down into 1,394 undergraduates and 962 graduate students.

2. Initiation: The first Beta Gamma Sigma initiation at IUSB will be held at 8 p.m. today in the Northside West lecture hall, N158. Invitations to join the national scholastic honorary business fraternity have been extended to 35 eligible students. Howard Harlow, Assistant Professor of Business Administration, will conduct the initiation ceremony. Chancellor Wolfson will be guest speaker.
3. Library Identification: IUSB Library administrators report several recent incidents of students posing as faculty members when checking out materials. Because student helpers in the Library do not always recognize faculty faces, faculty members may be asked to show identification at the check-out desk.
4. Positions: The Division of Public and Environmental Affairs is seeking a director for a federally-funded Title I project for St. Joseph County dealing with a System of Health Care Delivery for the Elderly. The job involves directing and teaching in training programs in health and nutrition, and conducting inter-disciplinary seminars in the psychological and sociological aspects of aging. Administrative experience is desirable, as is experience in working with a range of community-service agencies. A master's degree or teaching experience in public health, nutrition, health administration, or a related science specialty is desirable. Salary range, \$10,000 to \$13,000. Credentials and letters of reference should be sent by July 15 to Thomas A. DeCoster, director of the Division.

5. Faculty Activities: Wayne F. Echelberger, Jr., Public and Environmental Affairs, is taking part this week in the Indiana Executive Program of the I.U. Graduate School of Business in Bloomington; his topic is "Business and

Environmental Quality Control." In late May, he discussed "Water Pollution Control Technology" at the Center for Professional Advancement in Somerville, N.J. On May 17, he spoke to the South Bend Exchange Club on "Water Pollution-- A Time for Corrective Action." Earlier in May, he presented a program on "Wastewater Problems and Treatment" at the Florida Institute of Technology, Jensen Beach, Fla.

Paul A. Joray, Economics, has been selected tentatively as a member of the Indiana Education Employment Relations Board's mediation and fact-finding panel; he attended a one-day briefing session May 31 at the IUPUI Law School. On June 2, he was part of a three-person panel on WSBT-TV's "Assignment 22" program, discussing rail reorganization and its effects on Northern Indiana. Dr. Joray and Paul S. Kochanowski, Economics, both testified on the Department of Transportation's rail reorganization proposal at the Interstate Commerce Commission hearings held last week on the IUSB campus. They testified on the economic impact expected from the proposed rail discontinuation.

E. Marcia Kimmel, Education, attended the International Reading Convention in New Orleans early in May. On May 22, she was a panel participant for the Bnai B'rith Women; the panel considered the role of women in Judaism. On May 21, she spoke on "Educating Women for the Future" at the 38th annual meeting of the Mishawaka Education Association in the Lincoln Highway Inn. She has been elected chairperson of the Task Force on Careers for Women, sponsored by the Indiana Career Resource Center; she also is chairperson for a subcommittee of the Task Force on Sexism and Education.

Karen M. Rasmussen, History, and George A. Wing, Business Administration and Economics, attended an Inner-Asian Seminar May 24 through 26 in Bloomington, sponsored by the Department of Uralic and Altaic Studies of Indiana University.
