2. Handbooks: Any resident and associate faculty who did not pick up a faculty handbook at the August 28 Academic Senate meeting should obtain a copy from Mrs. Duncan, assistant to the Dean of Faculties, Room N111.
3. Sabbatical Leave: The deadline for filing for sabbatical leave is October 15. Filings should be made to department chairmen, and must be delivered by them to the Chancellor's office by November 1. Applications are available in Dean Risler's office.
4. Reimbursement Rates Up: Pursuant to authorization by the 1971 General Assembly, the State Budget Agency approved the following reimbursement rates for authorized travel, effective last July 1:

Out-of-state per diem.....	\$20
In-state per diem.....	\$16
Use of private auto per mile.....	10¢

Account managers should note that there will be no change in travel funds approved in the 1971/72 operating budget because of reimbursement-rate increases. In some cases, therefore, it may be necessary to consider a reduction in the number of trips, according to the office of the University vice-president and treasurer.

5. Associates' Cafeteria 'Closed': For those who missed the mid-summer announcement, we have been informed by officers of Associates Investment Co. that new security procedures make it necessary to restrict the use of the Associates Cafeteria to Associates employees and those who are in the Associates building on official business.

Associates therefore had to withdraw, with regret, the cafeteria privilege it formerly extended to IUSB faculty and staff members.

6. Faculty ID Cards: Faculty and staff who want official Indiana University identification cards may obtain them through the Assistant to the Dean of Faculties, Mrs. Duncan, in Room N111.

Blank cards are available from Mrs. Duncan. The blanks must be signed and the faculty member should supply a small portrait (1 inch by 1-5/16 inch), plus \$1.50. Cards will be processed by the Bloomington photo lab and returned to the owners.

Those who want cards revalidated may have that done through Mrs. Duncan. There is no charge for revalidation.

7. NEH Fellowships: The office of Associate Dean for Research and Advanced Studies Harry G. Day has been notified that a limited number of National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) fellowships and stipends will be awarded to younger humanists, under 40 years of age, in the academic year 1972/73 and the summer of 1972. It is probable that the awards will be limited to not more than one for a summer stipend and one for a fellowship per institution.

Nominations must be submitted by the institution and must be postmarked no later than October 25, 1971. Eligible faculty members interested in being nominated should submit applications to the Office of Research and Advanced Studies by 4 p.m. on October 15. A recommendation from the departmental or divisional chairman of each applicant should be submitted at the same time.

Applications should indicate how the project may contribute to the growth of the applicant as a scholar, teacher, or interpreter of the humanities. Creative or performing activities in the arts are excluded.

Following the deadline, an all-University committee will screen applications, and the most promising applicant in each category will be recommended for nomination by the University. All applicants for NEH summer stipends will be considered for IU Summer Faculty Fellowships.

Senior fellowships will be awarded to persons who have produced significant work and who have considerable experience as scholars. Applicants in this category should deal directly with the Division of Fellowships and Stipends of the NEH, Washington, D. C., 20506.

Applications for support of original thought, basic research, and editing projects in the humanities and in those aspects of the social sciences that have humanistic content may be made at different times during the year. The Office of Research and Advanced Studies offers as much aid as possible in providing additional information and guidance.
