Finding aids now available online:

Robert Elisha Burke papers, 1904-1957, Collection C94: This collection contains material created and collected by Robert Elisha Burke. Burke became a professor at Indiana University shortly after his graduation from the Pratt Institute in New York. He completed work for his A.B. and M.A. while teaching. In 1921 he became the head of the Fine Arts Department and held that position until 1941. Included are lecture notes, travel notes, some personal information, three bound volumes consisting of lectures, paintings, and other representations of his work, and an album containing photos and postcards of his U.S. travels. The majority of the materials relate to his teaching career at I.U. (1 cubic foot)

John Simpson Hastings papers, 1933-1977, Collection C119: Indiana University alumnus and charter member of the IU Foundation. John Simpson Hastings graduated from the Indiana University School of Law in 1924 and practiced law in his hometown until 1957 when he was appointed to the United States Court of Appeals. Hastings maintained close ties to Indiana University, serving as president of the Alumni Association, vice president and board member of the Indiana University Foundation, president and member of the Board of Trustees, and member of the School of Law Board of Visitors. Collection includes correspondence, speeches and other subject files, and memorabilia. The correspondence primarily consists of IU related topics such as the IU Foundation and the Alumni Association, and of correspondence with prominent IU officials William Lowe Bryan, John W. Ryan, and Herman B Wells. (2 cubic feet)

Indiana University Graduate Library School records, 1940-1978, Collection C317: In 1947, the Indiana University Division of Library Science (DLS) was established as a division within the School of Education with Margaret I. Rufsvold serving as director. In 1966, the Graduate Library School was established as a separate academic unit. In 1980, the name was changed to the School of Library and Information Science. Collection includes correspondence, publications, annual reports, student data, project information, and records related to workshops and conferences held by the Library School throughout the years. The bulk of the records date from Margaret Rufsvold's tenure as director and dean of the program, but the collection does include records from her successors, Charles H. McMullen, who served as acting dean until Bernard Fry was appointed in 1967. Fry served as dean until his retirement in 1980. (10 cubic feet)

Roger G. Newton papers, 1955-2003, Collection C320: Roger G. Newton is a Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Physics at Indiana University. His primary research interests include field theory, scattering theories, nuclear and high energy physics, elementary particles, quantum mechanics, and mathematical physics. The collection consists of Newton's papers created and collected during his tenure at IU, including correspondence, files on committees and conferences, review board records and materials relating to his books. No teaching files are included in this collection. (9 cubic feet)

Online Service Showcases Campus Research

A new online service led by the IUB Libraries promises to increase the visibility of the university's research by providing a permanent digital home for scholarly materials.

IUScholarWorks, launched this year, empowers IU researchers to post their research, such as peer-reviewed materials, conference and working papers, and research data on the Internet.

Because the service guarantees a permanent Internet address and provides worldwide accessibility via search engines like Google, materials are more easily discovered by other researchers.

"This service showcases the work of IU scholars and increases its impact," says Julie Bobay, director of scholarly communication initiatives for the IUB Libraries.

"Libraries have a longstanding commitment to preserving and increasing access to information," says Bobay. "And now in the digital age, faculty members who want to preserve their scholarly work and make it accessible to the world continue to rely on our support and leadership."

The overriding goal, Bobay says, is to create a repository for research materials generated at Indiana University and to give individual researchers easy-to-use tools to ensure that their scholarly output is both organized and always available.

The service provides a way to increase visibility of not only published materials, which can be posted if the author has the rights from the publisher to do so, but also unpublished materials known as "gray literature," which may include conference papers, working papers, and primary evidence.

IUScholarWorks is a service of the IUB Libraries and the Digital Library Program.

The Digital Library Program is a collaborative effort of the IU Libraries and the Office of the Vice President for Information Technology, through the Research Computing Division of University Information Technology Services,

and the university research faculty with leadership from the School of Library and Information Science and the School of Informatics.
