1. Title I Funds Available: The State of Indiana has received a grant amounting to \$207,111 under Title I of the Higher Education Act of 1965. The money is to be used by colleges and universities to develop community service and continuing education programs. In its State Plan and 1970 amendments, the Title I State Agency outlined the community problems to be considered during 1970.

We have been asked by the Governor's office to inform our faculty of the availability of Title I funds for community service activities. Guidelines for submitting proposals are on file in Dean Risler's office. Dr. Thomas A. DeCoster, Assistant Professor of Economics, has offered to share his expertise in application procedures.

Deadline for submitting proposals is May 1. Awards will be made by June 1. For additional information, interested faculty may contact Michael Murphy in Gov. Whitcomb's office. His phone number is 317-633-4567.

2. Paydays: Some questions arose concerning the timing of the last payday. The Business Office offers this policy resume:

Salary check distribution is standard throughout the University. All monthly checks are disbursed on the first day of the month following the pay month.

Should a first day fall on a Saturday, an effort is made to provide checks on Friday. If the first is on a Sunday, payday is Monday.

There are only two exceptions to that schedule: January 1 checks are distributed on the Friday before Christmas holiday begins; and July 1 checks are provided approximately two weeks after the spring semester ends.

The recent problem related to faculty checks prior to Spring vacation occurred because Easter was so early in the year. Apparently, no provision was made by Bloomington's Payroll Department to cover this rarely occurring event.

3. CEA Address: Dr. Francis J. Molson, Assistant Professor of English, will address the annual, national meeting and conference of the College English Association at the University of Notre Dame's Center for Continuing Education on April 24.

Dr. Molson's lecture is entitled, "Relevance and Reality in Student Life Styles." Theme of the meeting is "Contemporary Relevance and the Teaching of Literature."

4. Basketball Call: A student-faculty basketball game is in the works for Sesquicentennial Week if there are enough faculty volunteers to put a team on the court. Anyone interested should contact Charles P. Lehman (Ext. 301) or Joan Janicki (Ext. 203). May 5 is the date.
5. 'Artist's Vision': The IUSB Student Fine Arts Club will sponsor a lecture by James Brubaker, WSJV-TV Art Director, at 8 p.m. on Wednesday, April 22, in Room N118. Titled "An Artist's Vision of Motion," the talk will outline Brubaker's concept of motion, animation and multi-imagery, beginning with the anatomy of a simple sketch and developing it through painting, collages, assemblages, and photography to the complexities of film-making.
6. Film Prize: Matthew Zivich, Instructor in Fine Arts, has won a cash prize in the "Refocus 8/ Super 8 Film Festival" at the University of Iowa, held late in March. The prize was awarded for "War Movie!" a black and white sound film with hand-tinted portions.

The prize was the second of two grand prizes issued during the competition.
7. Publication: Dr. Neal B. Long Jr., Assistant Professor of Economics, has had a paper, "An Input-Output Comparison of the Economic Structure of the U.S. and the U.S.S.R.," accepted for publication in The Review of Economics and Statistics, which is published under the auspices of the Department of Economics of Harvard University.
8. Deadline: Bookstore Manager Althea Snyder reminds faculty that today is the deadline for book order requests for summer school. The bookstore is still taking orders for caps and gowns.

9. 'Birth' Rescheduled: A showing of the film "Birth of a Nation", originally scheduled for early this week, has been reset for Thursday and Friday at 8 p.m. Thursday's showing will be in Room N126 and Friday's in Room N118. Student Government Film Committee is the sponsor.
10. Director Sought: Fort Lewis College in Durango, Colo., is seeking a director for its School of Arts and Sciences. The institution is a small state-supported, liberal arts college with approximately 2,000 students. The School of Arts and Sciences, being established under a college-wide reorganization, will have 60 to 65 faculty members and about two-thirds of the students.

Candidates for the position should have some experience in academic administration. A Ph. D. in one of the standard arts or science fields and some teaching experience are among the requirements.

11. Film and Lecture: The New York Film Critics award-winning film, "China," by Felix Green, will be shown at IUSB at 8:15 p.m. Tuesday, April 21, in Room N118.

The film will be introduced by Miss Maud Russell, distinguished editor and publisher of the Far East Reporter and a resident of China for 26 years as a YMCA worker. Since leaving China in 1943, Miss Russell has written, lectured and published extensively on China. In 1958, she returned to that country for several months, and she continues to correspond with many of China's residents. She is now 72.

She will be available for questions about the film and about other aspects of China. The program is sponsored by the South Bend Bail Project, Inc.; admission is \$.75.

12. Substitution: Today's "Experiment in Black Studies" program will be "The Way It Is," a documentary exploring the ghetto school, rather than "Inter-cultural Relationships: The Situation," which was originally scheduled for today's viewing. The televised series is shown in Room N121.

13. WNDU-TV Series: The Division of Business and Economics has agreed to furnish WNDU-TV, Channel 16, a biweekly economic briefing series, which will be shown on the evening news every other Friday. The first briefing was shown April 10, with J. Scott Mason, Lecturer in Business Administration. The next is scheduled for April 24. Dr. John R. Swanda Jr., Assistant Professor of Business Administration, is coordinator of the series.
