From Seminary Square to Spanker's Branch and Beyond: Campus Landscape Design at Indiana University

At the 1918 Commencement, featured speaker Colonel Theodore Roosevelt said, "I want to say at the outset that I don't think I have ever been at a more beautiful university commencement than this. I shall always keep in mind this scene here in the open by the University buildings, a university which, in what we are apt to think of as a new nation, is approaching its centenary, here under these great trees, these maples and beeches, that have survived over from the primeval forest...it is a sight I shall never forget; it will always be with me..." While the campus as we know it today looks quite different from what it did in 1918, much of the natural beauty of the campus landscape has been retained over the decades through the ever evolving collaborative effort of numerous creative minds. The vision began in October 1883, when the campus Building Committee walked the grounds of the new campus to select the site for the first classroom building, and in the following decades included the plans of designers such as George E. Kessler of Kansas City, the Olmsted Brothers firm of Brookline, Massachusetts, and others. Most recently, in

February 2009 the Board of Trustees approved a 20-year development plan for the university submitted by SmithGroup/JJR based out of Washington D.C. Drawn from the collections of the Indiana University Archives, this exhibit includes architectural plans, correspondence, and photographs.

N. Gary Lane Publications and research notes, 1963-1989, Collection C348: Norman Gary Lane was a professor of Geology and Paleontology at IU from 1973-1994. The Lane collection consists of articles and research notes relating to his work in the geological field spanning the period from 1963 to 1989. (1.4 cubic feet)

Karl F. Schuessler papers, 1933-2005, Collection C354: Karl F. Schuessler graduated at Indiana University in 1947 with a Ph.D. in sociology. Soon after his graduation, he joined the faculty at Indiana University, where he remained until his retirement in 1985. This collection contains Schuessler's published articles, manuscripts, correspondence, and subject files. (4 cubic feet)

Next Digital Library Brown Bag

Greetings! Please join us this coming Wednesday, April 22nd for our final digital library brown bag presentation by John Walsh and Michelle Dalmau. The presentation will be held at the Herman B Wells Library, room E174, from 12:00-1:00.

Exploring the Works of Algernon Charles Swinburne: Topic Maps and the Text Encoding Initiative John A. Walsh, Assistant Professor, School of Library and Information Science Michelle Dalmau, Digital Projects & Usability Librarian, Digital Library Program

Topic Maps, including their XML representation, XML Topic Maps (XTM), are a powerful and flexible metadata format that have the potential to transform digital resource interfaces and support new discovery mechanisms for humanities data sources, such as large collections of TEI-encoded literary texts. The TEI (Text Encoding Initiative) Guidelines provide a rich and expansive XML vocabulary for representing the structure and textual features of documents, including literary and scholarly texts. XML Topic Maps are a web-accessible, standards-based format that provides the combined functionality of traditional information resources such as indices, glossaries, and thesauri. As such, Topic Maps can serve as powerful mechanisms for navigating large collections of interconnected digital objects, including TEI-based collections. Together, TEI and XML Topic Maps provide an interoperable and complementary platform for describing a corpus of texts in ways that enhances the exploration, utilization and value of the digital collection of texts for users.

The Swinburne Project (<http://swinburneproject.indiana.edu/>) serves as an ideal test bed for developing semantic web frameworks, supported by TEI and Topic Map encoding, that will enhance typical digital text collections.

Swinburne was arguably the most important British poet in the closing decades of the Victorian period in literature. He was an important cultural figure whose impact was felt beyond the domains of literature and poetry, and he is an ideal central figure for the study of a wide range of nineteenth-century cultural and historical topics.

To address the breadth and range of form and allusion in Swinburne's work, the Swinburne Project aims to unite digitized texts—encoded in XML according to the Text Encoding Initiative Guidelines—and semantic web technologies, such as Topic Maps, to construct a complex database of nineteenth-century British culture with Swinburne at its center.

Semantic Web technologies, coupled with the explicit encoding of "topics" such as genre forms and references to people, biblical figures, mythological figures, Arthurian figures, as well as events, and works by other artists and poets, allow one to build elaborate indices, data visualizations, and metadata-driven navigation mechanisms for the collection.

A White Collaborative Award received in March of 2008 has helped establish a more consistent, user-friendly topic map taxonomy and encoding workflow. Stop by and learn about Topic Maps, the Swinburne Project, and how the integration of the two can lead to dynamic exploration and deeper understanding of Swinburne's texts.

Presentation slides and audio will be available via the Connect Meeting Service (formerly known as "Breeze"). Go toto view and listen to the
