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I.U.E. PERIODICALS LIST

Lynn Condon, Pam Carson, and I have prepared a list of the periodicals to which we are now subscribing. In addition to the alphabetical list of titles, there is a classified list by subject. If you would like to suggest other titles in your field of interest, kindly let me know. It is well to keep in mind that a periodical subscription may become a recurring expense and also may require binding in the future.

Last June the Social Sciences and Humanities Index became two separate indexes in order to cover a wider range of periodicals. (Before it was the SS and H, it was called International Index.) Social Sciences Index now includes more nursing and criminal justice titles for example. These indexes provide access to journal literature, and your decision to subscribe may be influenced by the greater coverage. If you'd like to check the lists of journals now indexed, stop by the Library.
