The process of converting the digitized MDPI media into something that can be used for web delivery is conceptually simple: transcode each one into derivatives and transfer them to the delivery system. However, like most things, the devil is in the details. Data corruption, tape latency, and managing large amounts of data are just a few of the problems which must be overcome.

This session will follow the steps that MDPI digital objects take during processing and explore the solutions used to create a system which must reliably process hundreds of hours of audio and video content daily.

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Call for Proposals: 5th Annual Indiana University Libraries Information Literacy Colloquium

DATE: Friday, August 5, 2016

PLACE: Indiana University Southeast, New Albany Indiana

THEME: Critical Information Literacy: Empowering Learners for Social Change

Critical pedagogy is an approach to teaching and learning that envisions the educational environment as a site for social change. Practitioners of critical information literacy instruction seek to incorporate an emphasis on social justice into the library setting in a number of ways, including resisting the passive banking method of teaching and learning, disrupting and transforming the power relations between teacher and learner, validating student voice and experiential knowledge, and exposing how oppression and societal inequities shape information production and dissemination.

The planning committee for the IU Libraries Information Literacy Colloquium is seeking proposals for 45-minute interactive breakout session presentations that investigate, examine, or describe how critical pedagogy can be enacted in the library instruction setting. Suggested topics include, but are not limited to:

- Critical pedagogy teaching strategies for information literacy instruction
