2. Singer Lecture: The distinguished writer Isaac Bashevis Singer will discuss "Contemporary Literature" in N158 at 8:15 p.m. Thursday, co-sponsored by the Office of Continuing Education and the Jewish Community Council of St. Joseph County.

IUSB students, faculty, and staff members will be admitted without charge. Complimentary tickets can be obtained in the Continuing Education office, N017.

3. Charge: Because of a "breakdown," IUSB's synthesizer is currently operating on batteries. Barton K. McLean, Music, says battery chargers are needed -- the kind that recharge automobile batteries. Anyone willing to lend a charger to the Music Division should contact Dr. McLean.
4. Saturday Service: During February and March, the IUSB Computing Center will experiment with Saturday hours. For the two months, the center will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays. At the end of the trial period, the utility of the service will be evaluated.
5. Mystery Cycle: Dr. Peter Arnott will return to IUSB at 8:15 p.m. Friday, February 23, to present a mediaeval mystery cycle of six plays in the Northside auditorium. The event is co-sponsored by the IUSB Forensic Association and the IUSB Women's Club.

The dramas, in which Arnott interprets all parts and manipulates the marionettes, will be: "The Creation of the World," "The Creation of Adam and Eve," "The Temptation and Fall of Adam and Eve," "Cain and Abel," "Noah's Flood," and "Everyman."

All seats are reserved. Tickets are \$2 for the front half of the auditorium and \$1.50 for the back portion.

Arnott is professor of dramatic art at Tufts University. He produces marionette-theatre in order to give contemporary audiences the opportunity to see little-performed classics.

6. Contraceptive Society: The IUSB Division of Arts and Sciences has been awarded a grant to support a conference series on "The Community and the Contraceptive Society." The grant is from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities in cooperation with the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Co-directors of the project are Jonelle M. Farrow, Psychology, and John F. Santos, of the Notre Dame Psychology Department. The program will involve discussions among panelists from the humanities, with audience participation in the dialogue. The series will offer opportunities to consider questions related to family planning in the light of humanistic and related perspectives, and to explore such issues with interested members of the local community.

Five public conferences are planned, dealing with (1) Youth, Sex, and Contraceptives; (2) The Influence of Birth Control on Family Dynamics; (3) Population Policies and Individual Rights: Forced Compliance?; (4) The Changing Role of Women in a Contraceptive Society; (5) The Future of the Family in a Contraceptive Society.

Dates for the sessions and the names of participants will be announced.

7. Acapulco Break: The I.U. Alumni Association is sponsoring an "Acapulco Holiday" flight during the spring vacation. First-class accommodations cost \$297, plus 10 per cent for taxes and services; the rate includes breakfast and dinner. Deluxe accommodations cost \$319, plus 10 per cent for taxes and services; no meals are included. Covered are round-trip jet transportation from Chicago to Acapulco; an I.U. reception and party, and seven nights in the Del Monte Hotel (first-class) or the El Matador (deluxe).

A research paper by Eric A. Kimmel, Education, entitled "Children's Readings and Attitude Change," has been selected for presentation at the May International Reading Association convention in New Orleans.

Fred J. Naffziger, Business Administration, has been appointed a hearing officer for the Illinois Pollution Control Board; he will preside at hearings where the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency is alleging violation of the state's pollution laws by an individual, company, or municipality.
