Chancellor's Interview: A wide-ranging interview with Chancellor Wolfson will be re-broadcast at 9 p.m. today by Valley Cablevision's Channel 2. Conducted by student Michael Phebus, the interview was scheduled for initial broadcast Monday evening.

Annual Report: Two copies of the IUSB Annual Report for 1974-75 have been placed in the Library and are available for inspection.

Renew Parking Authorization: Safety and Security Officer Nester P. Stachowicz reminds faculty and staff members that those who want to continue the payroll-deduction system of paying for campus parking must re-execute an authorization form for 1975-76. Authorizations executed last year do not carry over into the new academic year.

Forms are available at the Safety and Security office, N032. Parking decals also are available there.

Funding Requests: Included in the request from the Indiana University Board of Trustees to the state Legislature for 1976-77 operating appropriations of \$131.6 million for the I.U. system is a sum of \$5.413 million for the South Bend campus.

The amount sought for IUSB is 22.8 per cent higher than the \$4.408 million appropriated for the current year.

The total University request is \$26 million (24.6 per cent) higher than the amount appropriated for the current year. The request, which goes to the Commission for Higher Education next, contemplates no increase in credit-hour fees for next year. It includes a \$5 million factor to cover additional expenses to I.U. resulting from increased enrollment this fall.

Allowances for price inflation constitute a major portion of the I.U. funding proposal. The budget is based on a guess that inflation will continue at an average annual rate of approximately 10 per cent.

An increase in personal service of \$12.5 million assumes a 12 per cent increase in the 1975-76 wage and salary base; 12 per cent will not only keep up with inflation, but will maintain the University's competitive position in faculty and supporting personnel compensation.

Unavoidable costs, supplies, and a sum for new degree programs are the other components of the funding request.

The Trustees also have requested a 1976-77 capital appropriations sum of \$22,168,750 for the I.U. system.

New Sounds V: A lecture-recital by composer Ramon Zupko and an artist-faculty ensemble from Western Michigan University will open the "New Sounds V" series at IUSB Friday at 8:15 p.m. in the Northside auditorium. The program includes three multi-media compositions by Zupko. Among the ensemble players will be Herbert Butler, cellist. There is a small admission fee.

Oliphint Recital: Bernadine R. Oliphint, Music, will present a recital at 8:15 p.m. Saturday in the Northside auditorium. Her program will range from the classical to the modern periods and will include arias from the operas "Il Re Pastore" by Mozart, "La Serva Padrone" by Pergolesi, and "Vanessa" by Samuel Barber. She will also sing four songs by Richard Strauss and selections from Benjamin Britten's song-cycle "Les Illuminations." There is no admission fee.

Poetry Reading: Analecta, IUSB's student literary-art magazine, will sponsor a faculty poetry reading on Friday, October 3, at 8:15 p.m. in the third-floor faculty lounge of Northside West.

Rogelio de la Torre, Spanish, Robert B. Cochran, English, and Tom R. Vander Ven, English, will read from their original works.

Education-TV Workshop: "Workshop '75: Television for Higher Education," a two-day workshop for faculty members and administrators interested in the use of television in the higher-education process, will be held Thursday, October 2, and Friday, October 17.

Sponsored by IHETS, which will tie together workshop sessions at 10 locations throughout the state, the conference will be held on the South Bend campus in N108 (October 2) and N106 (October 17).

Judith A. Redwine, Education, will coordinate the conference on this campus. Part of the program is an IHETS segment she produced. All IUSB faculty and administrators are invited to both sessions, she said. Each will begin with coffee and registration at 9:30 a.m. and will run all day. Pre-registration forms have been distributed to faculty through the campus mail. Additional copies are available from the University Relations office.

The conference will touch on the use of TV in higher education in Indiana and nationally; the varieties of classroom uses of TV;

cooperative production of televised materials; instructional programming available in Indiana, and funding of program development and production.
